Match background

Bayer 04 Leverkusen trail Chelsea FC by two points as the race to finish first in Group E comes to the boil and their ambitions will be enhanced if they can inflict a first defeat on the London side in this season's UEFA Champions League.

- A Chelsea victory would give them a place in the knockout rounds for the ninth successive season.
- In the 13 September fixture between the sides their first competitive meeting goals from David Luiz and Juan Mata gave Chelsea manager André Villas-Boas a winning start in his first game in the competition.
- Leverkusen then put their first points on the board with a 2-0 home win against KRC Genk before Valencia CF were beaten 2-1 at the BayArena, although they subsequently lost 3-1 in Spain.
- The Blues drew 1-1 at Valencia on matchday two before a 5-0 defeat of Genk their biggest home success in the UEFA Champions League and another 1-1 draw in the reverse fixture in Belgium.

Previous meetings

- Leverkusen's last European home game against English opponents ended in a 3-2 defeat of Blackburn Rovers FC in the 2006/07 UEFA Cup round of 32, ending a run of four successive home losses to Premier League sides.
- In a total of 16 fixtures against English opponents, the Werkself have won two, with ten ending in defeat; at home their record is W2 D2 L4. Chelsea have only lost three of their 12 European games against Bundesliga opponents, winning seven; in Germany their record reads W1 D1 L3.
- Chelsea's sole success was a 1-0 win at VfB Stuttgart in the round of 16 of the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League.
- They lost 3-2 at FC Bayern München in the 2004/05 quarter-final second leg but progressed having already won 4-2 at home. Michael Ballack scored a penalty for Bayern in the Stamford Bridge match.
- Chelsea defeated German opposition to win the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final in May 1998, Gianfranco Zola scoring the only goal against Stuttgart in Solna.

Match background

- Leverkusen are on course to match their achievement in their last UEFA Champions League group campaign seven years ago when they won all three home matches, against Real Madrid CF, AS Roma and FC Dynamo Kyiv.
- Chelsea have lost just one of their last nine away group games, winning four.

Team ties

- Ballack is in his second spell with Leverkusen, returning there in summer 2010 after four seasons at Chelsea following his 2006 move from Bayern. He won three FA Cups with the London club, the last in 2010 to complete a double with the Premier League, and in 2008 scored their first goal in the shoot-out to decide the UEFA Champions League final with Manchester United. The scores were tied at 1-1 after extra time with United winning 6-5 on penalties.
- Fernando Torres scored the winner for Spain in the UEFA EURO 2008 final in Vienna against a Germany side containing Ballack. In the quarter-finals Ballack and Simon Rolfes were involved as Germany won 3-2 against a Portugal team that included José Bosingwa and Paulo Ferreira, Ballack getting Germany's third goal.
- Frank Lampard, John Terry and Ashley Cole all played for England against Germany in the last 16 of the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa. Stefan Kiessling was an 83rd-minute substitute for Germany, who prevailed 4-1.
- When England played Germany at Wembley in August 2007, Gonzalo Castro and Rolfes were substitutes for the visitors, who won 2-1. Lampard scored the game's opening goal while Terry also featured for England.
- Torres' Spain team were 2-1 winners against a Czech Republic team including Michal Kadlec and Petr Čech in a UEFA EURO 2012 qualifier in Granada on 25 March.
- Florent Malouda's France won 1-0 in a 9 February friendly against the Brazil of David Luiz and Renato Augusto in Paris.
- In June Tranquillo Barnetta and Eren Derdiyok were in the Switzerland team that drew 2-2 at Wembley against an England side including Cole, Terry and Lampard; Barnetta scored both the visitors' goals.

- Michael Ballack, wearing a facial mask due to his broken nose, and Sidney Sam struck against their former side.
- Ballack has not lost to Kaiserslautern in 14 matches since leaving the club in 1999.
- Bastian Oczipka was a late substitute, making his debut for a club he joined aged ten in 1999.
- Leverkusen kept only their third clean sheet in 13 matches in all competitions.
- Ballack's goal at Kaiserslautern was his second in three league games having scored the winner against SC Freiburg on 28 October his first Bundesliga goal since 13 May 2006, when he struck for FC Bayern München in a 3-3 draw with Borussia Dortmund.

Injury news

- Oczipka had been out since breaking an ankle on loan at FC St Pauli on 19 February before his Leverkusen debut on Friday.
- André Schürrle missed Germany's friendly against the Netherlands on 15 November with flu and was rested at Kaiserslautern.
- Karim Bellarabi (out since 2 November) and Hanno Balitsch (9 November) have been sidelined with thigh injuries.
- Renato Augusto has not played since undergoing knee surgery in late October. Summer signing Michael Ortega, yet to make his debut for the club, had an operation after injuring his left knee on 5 September.
- First-choice goalkeeper René Adler has been sidelined since undergoing knee surgery in mid-July.
- Tranquillo Barnetta has not played since 4 June because of a persistent right knee problem.

International duty

- Michal Kadlec was in action as the Czech Republic beat Montenegro 3-0 in the UEFA EURO 2012 play-offs, following a 2-0 home win on 11 November with a 1-0 success in Podgorica four days later.
- Ömer made his Turkey debut in a 0-0 play-off draw in Croatia on 15 November. They had lost the first leg 3-0.
- Substitute Simon Rolfes scored Germany's second in a 3-3 friendly draw against Ukraine on 11 November. Schürrle also came on as a replacement.

• Sporting director Rudi Völler extended his contract until summer 2017 at the beginning of November.

- Chelsea slumped to their third loss in four Premier League games after a defeat that leaves them 12 points behind leaders Manchester City FC.

- Coupled with the 5-3 defeat by Arsenal FC on 29 October, Chelsea slipped to consecutive Premier League losses at Stamford Bridge for the first time since Roman Abramovich bought the club in 2003.
- Daniel Sturridge's five league goals this season have come at an average of one every 108 minutes.
- The 1-0 win at Blackburn Rovers FC on 5 November was Chelsea's sole clean sheet in their last 11 league games.
- Chelsea will host Liverpool again in the League Cup quarter-finals on 29 November.

Injury news

- Didier Drogba started on Sunday following an elbow injury, his first appearance since being sent off on 23 October.
- Alex and John Obi Mikel recovered from back injuries to face Blackburn on 5 November.
- Petr Čech broke his nose at Blackburn but six days later he played for the Czech Republic wearing a protective mask.
- Michael Essien could be out of action until January after suffering knee ligament damage in pre-season training.

International duty

- Raul Meireles (Portugal 6-2 Bosnia and Herzegovina) and Čech (Czech Republic 3-0 Montenegro) helped their sides reach UEFA EURO 2012 with play-off victories.
- Sturridge made his senior international debut in England's 1-0 home friendly win against Sweden on 15 November.
- · Captain Frank Lampard scored the only goal of England's win against Spain on 12 November.

Miscellaneous

• Drogba, who took the prize in 2006 and 2009, is one of ten players nominated for CAF African Footballer of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Accra on 22 December.

- One of the new breed of German coaches whose second career has eclipsed modest playing days, Dutt rose through the ranks of several clubs in southern Germany as he methodically learned his trade.
- From 1995 to 1999 he was player-coach at non-league Leonberg, whom he led to promotion before taking over Ditzingen's reserves, becoming coach of their first team, then in the fourth tier, in 2000. Two years later accepted the offer to take charge of the reserve side of former Bundesliga outfit Stuttgarter Kickers, stepping up to the third tier and the first team a year later.
- Awarded the UEFA Pro Licence as top of his class in 2005, the same year he guided Stuttgarter Kickers to the first of successive victories in the regional Württemberg Cup. Thus qualified for the first round of the national trophy, his side duly knocked out Hamburger SV in September 2006.
- Having already been linked with several higher-profile clubs, Dutt took over Freiburg in summer 2007, finishing fifth in the 2. Bundesliga in his first season before winning the division, and promotion to the top flight, a year later.
- Took Freiburg to 14th position in the Bundesliga in 2009/10 and led the club to sixth place at the halfway stage of the following campaign; they eventually finished ninth, earning Dutt the chance to take charge of Leverkusen.

- An amateur player in his teens with Ramaldense FC and Clube Marechal Gomes da Costa, Villas-Boas never played professional football, laying the groundwork for a coaching career with a spell as a teenage talent scout during Sir Bobby Robson's spell as coach of Porto in the mid-1990s.
- Still in his 20s, he took on a role as technical director with the British Virgin Islands Football Association in 2000, but was back working with Porto's youth players by the time José Mourinho took him into his inner circle following his appointment as Porto coach in January 2002.
- Initially detailed to scout upcoming opponents, he followed 'The Special One' from success to success at Porto, Chelsea and FC Internazionale Milano before striking out on his own as coach of Académica in October 2009.
- An 11th-placed finish in his only season in Coimbra was enough to persuade Porto to bring him in as Jesualdo Ferreira's replacement; hired in June 2010, he became the club's youngest ever coach aged just 32.
- Oversaw a memorable 2010/11 campaign at the Estádio do Dragão, becoming the first Portuguese to guide a side through a Liga campaign unbeaten, winning the Super Cup, national championship and Portuguese Cup as well as the UEFA Europa League after beating SC Braga in the Dublin final. He joined Chelsea on a three-year deal on 22 June 2011.

- Viktor Kassai works as a travel agent in his native Hungary and his progress to UEFA's list of Elite referees has ensured plenty of opportunities to broaden his horizons still further.
- Born on 10 September 1975, Kassai has taken charge of more than 100 matches in the Hungarian top flight, getting his first taste of international action in the 2001 UEFA Regions' Cup.
- Kassai, whose principle interests are sports and film, officiated two UEFA Cup matches in 2003/04 and the following season brought his first UEFA Champions League engagement, the second qualifying round first leg between HNK Hajduk Split and Shelbourne FC. Went on to officiate FIFA World Cup and UEFA European Under-21 Championship games the same season.
- In July 2005 Kassai refereed three games at the UEFA European U19 Championship in Northern Ireland and has remained a regular in international fixtures ever since, also working at the 2007 FIFA U-20 World Cup in Canada.
- Worked as a fourth official at UEFA EURO 2008, where he was given three matches, and was a referee at the football tournament at the Olympic Games in Beijing later that summer, taking charge of the final as Argentina defeated Nigeria. Oversaw four games at the 2010 World Cup, including the Germany-Spain semi-final, and seven matches in the UEFA Champions League the following season, concluding with the Wembley final between FC Barcelona and Manchester United FC.

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona have avoided becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
