Match background

Chelsea FC have made their customary strong start in the UEFA Champions League and in their first meeting with KRC Genk will be looking to extend an unbeaten home record in the group stage which stretches back eight years.

Previous meetings

- As well as the first meeting between the teams, this is also Genk's maiden experience of opponents from England.
- All six of Chelsea's previous fixtures against Belgian sides have produced a decisive scoreline and in each case the losing team failed to score.
- The Blues have won all three home games, the first of which was a 1970/71 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup quarter-final – en route to lifting the trophy – when a 4-0 second-leg triumph against Club Brugge KV overturned a 2-0 loss in Belgium.
- It was a similar story at the same stage of the same competition in 1994/95, Chelsea losing 1-0 at Club Brugge before a 2-0 home success.
- In the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League group stage Chelsea were 1-0 winners against RSC Anderlecht thanks to an early Frank Lampard goal. Petr Čech, Michael Essien, John Terry, Didier Drogba were also in the home team while Anthony Vanden Borre lined up for the opposition. The Blues subsequently won 2-0 in Belgium.

Match background

- Chelsea began with a 2-0 defeat of Bayer 04 Leverkusen, David Luiz and Juan Mata giving new manager André Villas-Boas a winning start in the competition and securing the London club's eighth matchday one victory in ten attempts.
- Lampard subsequently put Chelsea ahead at Valencia CF but a late Roberto Soldado penalty denied them all three points.
- Genk marked their return to Europe's elite club competition after nine years with a hard-earned point at home to Valencia in their first game. They then went down 2-0 at Leverkusen two weeks later.
- Last season Chelsea won all three home games in the group and reached the quarter-finals where they bowed out to Premier League rivals Manchester United FC, losing 1-0 at home and 2-1 away. That denied them a sixth semi-final appearance in eight years.
- Chelsea are unbeaten in 24 group stage fixtures at Stamford Bridge, winning 18 and drawing six since a 2-0 reverse at the hands of Beşiktaş JK on 1 October 2003.
- On their only previous participation, in 2002/03, Genk finished bottom of their group with four points. On their travels they lost 6-0 at Real Madrid CF but then gained draws at AS Roma (0-0) and AEK Athens FC (1-1).
- Genk reached the group stage in dramatic circumstances, the Belgian champions overturning Maccabi Haifa FC's 2-1 first-leg advantage in the play-offs to win by the same score in the return. With no addition to the 3-3 aggregate score in extra time it went to a shoot-out, Genk winning 4-1 thanks to two saves from goalkeeper László Köteles.
- Coach Frank Vercauteren stepped down after the first leg against Haifa. Pierre Denier was in caretaker charge for the return before Mario Been was appointed as Vercauteren's permanent successor on 30 August.

Team ties

- Villas-Boas was in charge of FC Porto last season when they beat Genk 7-2 on aggregate in the UEFA Europa League play-off round, winning 3-0 away and 4-2 at home. Both Genk goals were scored by Jelle Vossen.
- Thibaut Courtois left Genk for Chelsea this summer, and was loaned out to Club Atlético de Madrid for this season.
- Romelu Lukaku, who is not in Chelsea's UEFA Champions League squad, played for Anderlecht until this summer. He scored 33 goals in 72 league appearances after making his debut in August 2009 before moving to Stamford Bridge.
- Lukaku is an international team-mate of Vossen, Kevin De Bruyne and Marvin Ogunjimi for Belgium.
- Been was an assistant coach at Feyenoord in 2003/04 when Salomon Kalou was at the Rotterdam club.
- Čech and Daniel Pudil are Czech Republic international team-mates.

- Chelsea extended their winning Premier League run to three matches. They have scored 12 goals in that time, beating Swansea City FC 4-1 and Bolton Wanderers FC 5-1.
- Frank Lampard scored a hat-trick at Bolton, his 350th league appearance for Chelsea. His goals took him on to 119 league strikes for the club, moving him fifth on Chelsea's all-time list.
- John Terry made his 350th league appearance for Chelsea against Everton.
- The Blues have kept just one clean sheet in their last 12 league games and none in the last seven; the latter run is their longest since September 2003.
- The London club will visit Everton in the League Cup fourth round on 26 October.

Injury news

- Midfielder Michael Essien could be out of action until January after suffering ligament damage to a knee during pre-season training.
- David Luiz has started both Chelsea's UEFA Champions League games to date, although his appearance at Bolton on 2 October was his first in this season's Premier League and he was rested for the Everton match.
- Daniel Sturridge suffered a knee problem against Fulham FC on 21 September but returned against Bolton, scoring twice.

International duty

- Captain Terry, Ashley Cole and substitute Lampard helped England book their place at UEFA EURO 2012 with a 2-2 draw in Montenegro on 7 October.
- Florent Malouda found the net in France's 3-0 win against Albania on 7 October and also featured in the 1-1 draw against Bosnia and Herzegovina that clinched a place in next summer's finals.
- Branislav Ivanović scored Serbia's goal in a 1-1 home draw against Italy on 7 October, although the subsequent 1-0 defeat in Slovenia ended their UEFA EURO 2012 hopes.
- Juan Mata scored past Petr Čech as Spain won 2-0 in the Czech Republic on 7 October.
- John Obi Mikel's Nigeria missed out on a place in next year's Africa Cup of Nations for the first time since 1986 as they were held to a 2-2 draw by Guinea in their final qualifier on 8 October.
- Luiz scored an own goal as Brazil claimed a 2-1 friendly victory away to Mexico on 11 October.
- Didier Drogba scored his 50th goal in 76 internationals in the Ivory Coast's 4-3 friendly win against Israel on 10 August.

- Abel Masuero made his competitive debut at centre-back as Genk suffered their third successive defeat, leaving them without a win in four games, after goalscorer Christian Benteke was sent off on 43 minutes.
- Elyaniv Barda was starting a two-match suspension following his dismissal in the 1-1 draw against Oud-Heverlee Leuven on 24 September.
- Benteke's goal was the first Genk have scored in 235 minutes – since Jelle Vossen's effort against Leuven – their worst sequence since December 2009/January 2010 when they failed to score in 242 minutes.
- Genk are on 13 points in the First League; at this stage last term they had double that and were five points clear at the summit after eight wins and two draws from their opening ten fixtures.
- Mario Been took the reins on 30 August, 12 days after Frank Vercauteren's departure for United Arab Emirates outfit Al-Jazira Club. Pierre Denier led the side in the interim.
- Genk will play K. Lierse SK in the last 16 of the Belgian Cup on 26 October.
- Dániel Tózsér struck the only goal as Genk claimed their first Belgian Super Cup at the sixth attempt on 21 July, beating R. Standard de Liège despite playing over an hour with ten men after Vossen's dismissal.

Injury news

- Vossen twisted his ankle in the 1-0 defeat by RSC Anderlecht on 2 October but was fit to start at Lokeren.
- Pudil did not feature at Lokeren after returning from international duty with a hamstring injury.
- Nadson has not featured since suffering an ankle injury at Bayer 04 Leverkusen on matchday two.
- David Hubert (stomach, out since 28 September) and Jeroen Simaey (broken toe, 5 October) have been sidelined.
- Torben Joneleit could be out until April after tearing cruciate ligaments in his left knee against KV Mechelen on 27 August.

International duty

- Marvin Ogunjimi scored after coming on as a substitute as Belgium beat Kazakhstan 4-1 on 7 October, but their UEFA EURO 2012 ambitions ended with a 3-1 defeat by Germany four days later.
- Pudil played as the Czech Republic (0-2 loss v Spain, 7 October, and 4-1 away win v Lithuania, 11 October) secured a place in the UEFA EURO 2012 play-offs; they will face Montenegro next month.
- Anele Ngongca featured as South Africa drew 0-0 with Sierra Leone in Nelspruit on 8 October. The hosts celebrated, thinking they had sealed a 2012 Africa Cup of Nations spot, but later learned Niger had piped them courtesy of a superior head-to-head record.

Head coach

Chelsea FC: André Villas-Boas

Date of birth: 17 October 1977

Nationality: Portuguese

Coaching career: A. Académica de Coimbra, FC Porto, Chelsea FC

- An amateur player in his teens with Ramaldense FC and Clube Marechal Gomes da Costa, Villas-Boas never played professional football, laying the groundwork for a coaching career with a spell as a teenage talent scout during Sir Bobby Robson's spell as coach of Porto in the mid-1990s.
- Still in his 20s, he took on a role as technical director with the British Virgin Islands Football Association in 2000, but was back working with Porto's youth players by the time José Mourinho took him into his inner circle following his appointment as Porto coach in January 2002.
- Initially detailed to scout upcoming opponents, he followed 'The Special One' from success to success at Porto, Chelsea and FC Internazionale Milano before striking out on his own as coach of Académica in October 2009.
- An 11th-placed finish in his only season in Coimbra was enough to persuade Porto to bring him in as Jesualdo Ferreira's replacement; hired in June 2010, he became the club's youngest ever coach aged just 32.
- Oversaw a memorable 2010/11 campaign at the Estádio do Dragão, becoming the first Portuguese to guide a side through a Liga campaign unbeaten, winning the Super Cup, national championship and Portuguese Cup as well as the UEFA Europa League after beating SC Braga in the Dublin final. He joined Chelsea on a three-year deal on 22 June 2011.

KRC Genk: Mario Been

Date of birth: 11 December 1963

Nationality: Dutch

Playing career: Feyenoord, Pisa Calcio, Roda JC, sc Heerenveen, FC Tirol Innsbruck, SBV Excelsior

Coaching career: Feyenoord (assistant), SBV Excelsior, Trinidad & Tobago (assistant), NEC Nijmegen, Feyenoord, KRC Genk

- Developed in Feyenoord's youth department, the attacking midfielder played in the first team from 1982; his greatest success came in 1984 when he helped the Rotterdam giants, whose side included Johan Cruyff and Ruud Gullit, to the Dutch double, also winning the country's Talent of the Year prize and making his only appearance for the Netherlands in a friendly against Austria.
- As a skilled playmaker who also possessed a powerful shot, he earned the nickname Mariodona at Feyenoord; left in 1988 for Pisa, and had spells with Roda, Heerenveen and Tirol Innsbruck before ending his career in 1995 back in Rotterdam with Excelsior.
- In 2000 he became Bert van Marwijk's assistant at Feyenoord, winning the UEFA Cup in 2002; left in 2004 and the following year took over at Excelsior, whom he guided to promotion as second division champions in his first season.
- Worked as Leo Beenhakker's assistant with Trinidad & Tobago at the 2006 FIFA World Cup before taking charge of NEC, leading the club to fifth place in the Eredivisie in 2007/08 and reaching the round of 32 of the following season's UEFA Cup.
- Unable to resist the lure of Feyenoord, where he returned in summer 2009; finished fourth and reached the Dutch Cup final in his first season but his second campaign included a club record 10-0 defeat by PSV Eindhoven. Been stepped down in July 2011 but was back in football the following month, taking charge of Genk.

• Born in Moscow, Alexei Nikolaev has enjoyed a steady rise up the refereeing ladder and was promoted to the UEFA Premier category at the start of 2010.

• As with many referees, Nikolaev's early taste of European competition came as a fourth official, in his case in the UEFA European Under-19 Championship qualifying round in September 2003.

• Further engagements in the UEFA Champions League, UEFA Cup and UEFA Intertoto Cup followed before Nikolaev was selected to referee the U19 elite round game between Italy and Greece on 3 June 2007.

• His first taste of the UEFA Cup proper as a referee followed in December 2008, Hamburger SV overcoming Aston Villa FC 3-1. Also oversaw three games in qualifying for the 2009 European U21 Championship.

• Became a refereeing regular in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League, taking charge of five matches in the competition proper. Having been in the middle for the Fenerbahçe SK-BSC Young Boys second leg in the UEFA Champions League third qualifying round, Nikolaev was chosen to make his bow in the group stage on matchday one of 2010/11 when SL Benfica took on Hapoel Tel-Aviv FC and the following summer oversaw four games, including the Uruguay-Brazil semi-final, at the FIFA U-17 World Cup.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona are bidding to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 11 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
