Match background

FC Bayern München welcome Chelsea FC to Bavaria for a first UEFA Champions League final in which one of the finalists are competing in their home stadium, and the German club will hope to take advantage by winning their fifth European Cup.

- Bayern have won seven consecutive home matches en route to this final, including a victory against Real Madrid CF in the last four, but Chelsea's pursuit of their first European Cup was given a huge boost by their semi-final conquest of holders FC Barcelona.

Previous meetings

- Bayern and Chelsea met in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, the Blues prevailing 6-5 on aggregate against Felix Magath's Bayern.
- José Mourinho's Chelsea won the first leg 4-2 at Stamford Bridge. After Joe Cole's opener (4), Chelsea responded to Bastian Schweinsteiger's equaliser (52) through further strikes from Frank Lampard (60, 70) and Didier Drogba (80). Bayern's Michael Ballack (90) completed the scoring.
- The lineups for that fixture on 6 April 2005 were:

- Lampard (30) and Drogba (80) struck again in the second leg, either side of a Claudio Pizarro (65) goal. Bayern won 3-2 on the night through late goals from Paolo Guerrero (90) and Mehmet Scholl (90+5) but still went out on aggregate.

Match background

- Bayern are seeking to join Liverpool FC on five European Cup wins and become the joint-third most successful club in the competition's history behind Real Madrid and AC Milan.
- Bayern's record in European Cup finals is four wins and four defeats:
1974: 4-0 v Club Atlético de Madrid, Brussels (replay after 1-1 draw)
1975: 2-0 v Leeds United AFC, Paris
1976: 1-0 v AS Saint-Étienne, Glasgow
1982: 0-1 v Aston Villa FC, Rotterdam

- Bayern have won one and lost two of three previous European Cup finals against English clubs. They also lost the 2001 UEFA Super Cup 3-2 to Liverpool.
- Chelsea's only previous UEFA Champions League final appearance came in 2008 in Moscow when they suffered a 6-5 penalty shoot-out loss to Manchester United FC following a 1-1 draw.
- The Premier League club won the 1998 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup against VfB Stuttgart in a final in which their interim manager Roberto Di Matteo and his assistant Eddie Newton both played, the latter as a substitute.
- A Bayern victory would make Jupp Heynckes the 19th coach to have won the European Cup twice, following his 1998 success with Real Madrid. He would also become only the fourth to have triumphed with two different clubs after Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010).
- Bayern have already faced one English club this term, recording a 2-0 home win and identical away loss against Manchester City FC in the group stage – the defeat in Manchester came with qualification assured.

- Bayern have won 14 of their last 15 European home games and their victory against City left them with a home record against English clubs of W10 D5 L1. The only English side to have beaten Bayern in Munich are Norwich City FC, 2-1 victors in a UEFA Cup second round tie in 1993.
- Chelsea have won just once on their travels in this season's competition and have already lost in Germany, 2-1 at Bayer 04 Leverkusen on matchday five. It was their fourth defeat in six visits, their sole victory coming 1-0 at Stuttgart in the 2003/04 round of 16.
- Chelsea won 2-0 at home to Leverkusen in the group stage. Their overall record against Bundesliga opponents is W7 D2 L4.
- Bayern's overall record against English opponents is W13 D12 L10.
- This is the sixth European Cup final between German and English teams – only once previously did the Bundesliga side prevail:

- Munich has hosted three previous European Cup finals, all at the Olympiastadion, Bayern's former home:

- There have been three previous European Cup finals played at the home ground of one of the competing teams:

- Manchester United (1968, London), Ajax (1972, Rotterdam), Liverpool (1978, London), Juventus (1996, Rome) and Dortmund (1997, Munich) have won European Cup finals in their own country while Stade de Reims (1956, Paris), Barcelona (1986, Seville) and Manchester United (2011, London) all lost finals on home soil.

Team ties

- As a player with Mönchengladbach, Heynckes lost to Liverpool in the 1972/73 UEFA Cup final – despite two second-leg goals in a 3-2 aggregate defeat – and the 1976/77 European Cup final. The next year he lost out to the Anfield club again in the European Cup semi-finals.
- Heynckes was involved in the European Cup's first penalty shoot-out against Everton FC in the 1970/71 second round. He converted his kick but Mönchengladbach lost.
- Aside from his UEFA Cup Winners' Cup triumph against Stuttgart, Di Matteo was in an S.S. Lazio side defeated by Dortmund in the 1994/95 UEFA Cup quarter-finals – losing 2-0 in Germany after a 1-0 home win – and in the Italy team eliminated from EURO '96 after a goalless draw with Germany in their final group game.

- Manuel Neuer, Philipp Lahm, Jérôme Boateng, Schweinsteiger, Thomas Müller and substitute Mario Gomez were in the Germany side that beat an England side including John Terry, Ashley Cole and Lampard 4-1 in the 2010 FIFA World Cup round of 16.
- Cole played in England's 5-1 win against Germany at the Olympiastadion in a World Cup qualifier in 2001.
- Arjen Robben played for Chelsea from 2004 to 2007, winning two league titles and one FA Cup. He scored 15 goals in 67 league games for the London club.
- Florent Malouda and Paulo Ferreira played in the 2006 World Cup semi-final at the Fußball Arena München, Malouda starting for France in a 1-0 victory against a Portugal side for whom Ferreira appeared as a substitute. Bayern's Franck Ribéry was also in the France lineup.
- Torres hit Spain's UEFA EURO 2008 final winner against the Germany of Lahm, Schweinsteiger and Gomez.
- Torres was also a late substitute in the Spain team – with Mata an unused replacement – that beat Germany by the same 1-0 scoreline in the 2010 World Cup semi-finals. Neuer, Boateng, Lahm, Schweinsteiger and substitutes Gomez and Kroos featured for Germany.
- Ivica Olić scored when Croatia won 3-2 at Wembley to eliminate England from UEFA EURO 2008 qualifying despite Frank Lampard's penalty for the home side.
- Anatoliy Tymoschuk was in the Ukraine team that traded home wins with Terry, Cole and Lampard's England in the qualifying campaign for South Africa 2010.
- Neuer was beaten by goals from Drogba and Malouda when he and Rafinha lost 2-0 at Chelsea with FC Schalke 04 in the 2007/08 group stage.
- In his solitary season at Manchester City, Boateng made his debut as a late substitute in a 1-0 home win against Chelsea in September 2010.
- One of Daniel Van Buyten's six appearances on loan at Manchester City in the second half of the 2003/04 season was a 1-0 home loss to Chelsea.

- Jérôme Boateng is the only Bayern player to have appeared in all 1,110 minutes in the competition this season.
- Bayern have committed 195 fouls and collected 28 bookings, both more than any other side in the competition.
- Mario Gomez is this season's second highest scorer with 12 goals, two fewer than Lionel Messi. Only one other player – AC Milan's José Altafini got 14 in 1962/63 – has scored more than 12 in a European Cup campaign.
- Franck Ribéry has five assists, the joint highest total along with Messi, Kaká, Karim Benzema and Nicolás Gaitán.
- Ribéry has been fouled 42 times; more than any other player.
- Holger Badstuber, David Alaba and Luiz Gustavo are suspended after yellow cards in the semi-final second leg.

- Bayern's aspirations of claiming their 16th German Cup (no other side have won more than six) were ended by their heaviest domestic cup defeat in 40 years in the final in Berlin; it was also their fifth successive loss to Dortmund.
- It was their heaviest defeat in three years, since losing 4-0 at FC Barcelona in the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals on 8 April 2009.
- Bayern finished runners-up in the Bundesliga and have now gone two seasons without winning the title, their longest drought since Dortmund's last back-to-back championships in 1994/95 and 1995/96; back then, FCB gained consolation with the 1996 UEFA Cup.
- Jupp Heynckes's side have won 13 of their last 14 matches at the Fußball Arena München, drawing the other.
- The Bavarian outfit have won 22 of their 25 home games in all competitions this season, drawing once and losing twice, 1-0 to both Dortmund (19 November) and VfL Borussia Mönchengladbach (7 August).
- Ribéry scored 12 Bundesliga goals this term, passing his previous best of 11 set in 2007/08.
- Gomez has struck 42 goals in his last 51 appearances for club and country.
- Bayern's 2-0 win against VfL Wolfsburg on 28 January was Heynckes's 456th Bundesliga victory as coach and player, surpassing Otto Rehhagel's German top-flight record.
- Between 7 August and 18 October, Manuel Neuer and Bayern went a club record 1,147 minutes without conceding.

Injury news

- Daniel Van Buyten, who signed a new one-year deal at the end of April, has not played since breaking a metatarsal on 20 January but did feature for the reserves last Friday.
- Breno has not played this season because of a knee injury.

Miscellaneous

- Neuer, Badstuber, Boateng, Philipp Lahm, Toni Kroos, Thomas Müller, Bastian Schweinsteiger, Gomez (all Germany), Anatoliy Tymoshchuk (Ukraine), Ribéry (France), Robben (Netherlands) and Danijel Pranjić and Ivica Olić (Croatia) have all been included in provisional UEFA EURO 2012 squads.
- FC Basel 1893's Xherdan Shaqiri and Mönchengladbach defender Dante will join on four-year deals this summer, when Schweinsteiger's brother Tobias, 30, links up with Bayern's reserves from third tier SSV Jahn 2000 Regensburg.
- On Wednesday Bayern confirmed TSG 1899 Hoffenheim goalkeeper Tom Starke will join on a three-year contract.
- On 3 May, Arjen Robben signed a new two-year deal tying him to the club until summer 2015.
- In November, Neuer won €500,000 for charity in the German version of television show Who Wants to be a Millionaire?

- Chelsea have conceded 96 goals in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final, and the European Cup.

- Petr Čech is the only Chelsea player to have appeared in all 1,110 minutes in the competition this season.
- John Terry is suspended after his red card in the semi-final second leg while Branislav Ivanović, Ramires and Raul Meireles are also banned.

- A weakened Chelsea side, with Sam Hutchinson and Romelu Lukaku making first Premier League starts, beat already-relegated Blackburn as they ended sixth in the English top flight – their worst finish in ten years.
- Twenty of the 46 league goals Chelsea conceded this season came in the final 15 minutes.
- The Blues have failed to convert five of their ten spot kicks this term.
- Chelsea's 11-match unbeaten run in all competitions was ended by a 2-0 home reverse against Newcastle United FC on 2 May; they then lost their next league game 4-1 against Liverpool FC six days later. That took them to ten league defeats this season, more losses than in any other campaign since 2000/01.
- In between Chelsea lifted the FA Cup for the fourth time in six seasons with a 2-1 win against Liverpool at Wembley on 5 May thanks to a goal in each half from Ramires and Didier Drogba.
- Drogba's goal made him the first player to score in four FA Cup finals; the Ivorian has found the net in all seven of his domestic cup final appearances for Chelsea.
- The Blues dismissed manager André Villas-Boas on 4 March. His assistant Roberto Di Matteo was placed in charge until the end of the season and has overseen 13 victories, four draws and three defeats.
- Frank Lampard this season became the first player to score ten or more in nine successive Premier League campaigns with his goal against Bolton Wanderers FC on 25 February.

- One of the best strikers in Bundesliga history, Heynckes hit 220 goals in 369 games for Mönchengladbach and Hannover from 1964 to 1978; won four titles and a German Cup with Mönchengladbach and was the league's top scorer in 1974 (30 goals) and 1975 (27).
- Aged 34, replaced Udo Lattek as Mönchengladbach coach in 1979; mentored the young Lothar Matthäus but failed to win any trophies, losing to FC Bayern München in the 1983/84 German Cup final and reaching the UEFA Cup semi-finals three seasons later.
- Replaced Lattek again in 1987, this time at Bayern, winning 1989 and 1990 titles; club general manager Uli Hoeness called his decision to sack Heynckes in October 1991 "the biggest mistake of my career".
- Moved to Spain, earning Athletic Club a place in the 1994/95 UEFA Cup. His Tenerife side then reached 1996/97 UEFA Cup semi-finals, earning Heynckes a season as Madrid coach; led Los Merengues to UEFA Champions League glory in 1997/98 but left that summer.
- Following a lean spell, stepped in as caretaker manager at Bayern in April 2009 following Jürgen Klinsmann's dismissal; replaced Bruno Labbadia as Leverkusen coach the same summer, beginning with German record run of 24 unbeaten Bundesliga games. His side finished second to Borussia Dortmund in 2010/11, Heynckes leaving to take charge of Bayern for a third time at the end of the campaign.

Chelsea FC: Roberto Di Matteo

Coaching career: MK Dons FC, West Bromwich Albion FC, Chelsea FC (assistant, caretaker)

- Born in the Swiss city of Schaffhausen, Di Matteo started his career with the local club, scoring two goals in 50 league appearances over three seasons before moving to Zürich in 1991. Won the Swiss league title with Aarau in 1992/93, his sole season with the club, going on to a three-year spell at Lazio.
- Became Chelsea's record signing in 1996 and paid back a chunk of that €5.85m fee with goals in their 1997 FA Cup – after 42 seconds, then the fastest in the final's history – and 1998 English League Cup final victories. Scored the only goal of another FA Cup final triumph in 1999/2000, the last final at the old Wembley.
- Having won 34 caps for Italy, Di Matteo sustained a triple leg fracture in a UEFA Cup tie against FC St Gallen early in the 2000/01 campaign and was forced to retire in February 2002. Then-manager Claudio Ranieri asked him to lead out the team for the 2002 FA Cup Final, which Chelsea lost to Arsenal FC.
- Took charge of MK Dons in July 2008 and, having finished third in the English third tier, was appointed by West Brom the following summer. In his first season, led the club to second place in the Championship and promotion to the Premier League but sacked in February 2011.
- That June Di Matteo returned to Chelsea as assistant manager to André Villas-Boas and, following the Portuguese coach's dismissal on 4 March 2012, was appointed as interim first-team coach for the remainder of the season.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with six triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009 and 2011 – came from nine final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 11 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005 and 2008, and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 while Germany were winners in 1997 and 2001 and runners-up in 1999, 2002 and 2010.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan as 2007 marked their sixth appearance. They equalled Real Madrid CF's record of three victories with that triumph against Liverpool FC in Athens, a mark FC Barcelona matched in 2011 thanks to a final defeat of Manchester United FC.
- Italy with 26 has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals – of those 12 have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. England has recorded 11 wins from 18 final appearances. Spain has 22 final appearances (13 wins/nine defeats), Germany 14 (six wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- In the previous 19 finals, there have been 14 outright wins and five matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 49 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on four occasions, while three finals have finished 1-0.
- Fourteen European Cup finals have gone to extra time. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970 and 1992 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between FC Bayern München and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern subsequently winning a replay. The other nine finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008 when Manchester United FC defeated Chelsea FC 6-5 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karlheinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (2007) and Diego Milito (2010) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick in 1962 with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009) and Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009 and 2011) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – part of an exclusive club of 16 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Alfredo di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals for Madrid.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to be dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid CF 1998, AC Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) and José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United FC lost the 2011 final in London. Five teams won Champion Clubs' Cup finals on home soil: Real Madrid CF (1957), FC Internazionale Milano (1965), Manchester United FC (1968), AFC Ajax (1972) and Liverpool FC (1978), while Stade de Reims Champagne (1956), AS Roma (1984) and FC Barcelona (1986) all lost finals in their own country.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in FC Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer 04 Leverkusen on 7 March 2012. Eight players, including Messi, have scored four times in a game, most recently FC Bayern München's Mario Gomez on matchday eight this season.
