Match background

Chelsea FC are used to having things their own way at home in the UEFA Champions League and, after being held at Stamford Bridge on matchday one, they will be looking to return to winning ways with the visit of FC Shakhtar Donetsk.

- That will be no easy task, however, against a team who beat the holders 2-1 in Ukraine on matchday three thanks to goals from Alex Teixeira (3) and Fernandinho (52), Oscar's late reply not enough for the London club.
- Chelsea had kick-started their Group E campaign with a 4-0 win at competition newcomers FC Nordsjælland on matchday two having let slip a two-goal lead to draw 2-2 at home to Juventus in their first match. Shakhtar opened with a 2-0 home defeat of Nordsjælland before drawing 1-1 at Juve.
- The Ukrainian visitors are still looking for their first win in England but can take inspiration from their coach Mircea Lucescu, who led Beşiktaş JK to a 2-0 win at Stamford Bridge on 1 October 2003. It was Chelsea's last home defeat in the group stage; they have since gone unbeaten in 27 such games.

Match background

- The game in Donetsk was the first time Chelsea had met opponents from Ukraine while all the English teams Shakhtar have faced were based in London.
- The 2011/12 Ukrainian double winners have lost on three of their four visits to England. They only avoided defeat with a 1-1 draw at Tottenham Hotspur FC in the 2008/09 UEFA Cup round of 32, having won the home first leg 2-0, and went on to lift the trophy.
- A year later their title defence was ended by a 1-1 home draw against Fulham FC at the same stage after a 2-1 first-leg loss in London.
- Their last visit ended in a 5-1 reverse at Arsenal FC in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League group stage. They also went down 3-2 away to the Gunners in the 2000/01 first group stage.
- Chelsea won all three home group games in 2011/12, scoring ten goals without conceding, and recorded three more home victories in the knockout stages as they claimed the trophy for the first time.
- Shakhtar began last season's group stage with a 2-1 defeat at FC Porto and also lost 1-0 at FC Zenit St Petersburg. They concluded with a 2-0 victory at APOEL FC but still finished fourth in the section.

Team ties

- Tomáš Hübschman was part of the AC Sparta Praha team that lost 1-0 at home to Chelsea before drawing 0-0 away in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Petr Čech and Hübschman are team-mates for the Czech Republic and played together at Sparta in 2001/02.
- In his three-year spell with Arsenal FC between 2007 and 2010, Eduardo only once faced Chelsea in the Premier League, losing 3-0 at home on 29 November 2009.
- On 9 September 2009 Eduardo scored in Croatia's 5-1 defeat against England in a 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier at Wembley. Frank Lampard struck twice for the home team.
- Lampard was on target again at Wembley on 11 September, beating Andriy Pyatov from the penalty spot to earn England a 1-1 draw against Ukraine in qualifying for the 2014 World Cup. Yaroslav Rakitskiy played the whole match with Marko Đević and Vyacheslav Shevchuk coming on. Daniel Sturridge and Ryan Bertrand made competitive senior international debuts as substitutes for England.
- Pyatov, Rakitskiy and Đević all started the 1-0 group stage loss to England in Donetsk that eliminated co-hosts Ukraine from UEFA EURO 2012 on 19 June. Shevchuk and Olexandr Kucher were unused substitutes while Cole and John Terry played 90 minutes for England.
- Last year Oscar played alongside Ilsinho for SC Internacional.
- David Luiz helped SL Benfica to a 2-1 win in Donetsk in the 2007/08 group stage.
- Fernandinho and Willian play with Luiz, Ramires and Oscar in the Brazilian national team.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Alex Teixeira's goal on matchday three was the 100th Chelsea have conceded in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.
- Chelsea's 4-0 victory at FC Nordsjælland on matchday two was the fifth time the Blues have scored four or more goals in an away UEFA Champions League game.
- Chelsea became the fifth successive UEFA Champions League holders to draw on matchday one of the following season. As with the previous four, they won comfortably on matchday two.
- Before matchday one, Chelsea had only once previously let slip a two-goal lead in the UEFA Champions League, against AS Monaco FC in the 2004 semi-final.

Miscellaneous

- Victor Moses marked his first league start for Chelsea with a goal on Saturday in a 1-1 draw at Swansea City AFC. In 11 trips to Swansea, the Blues have managed just two victories.
- Daniel Sturridge marked his first start of the season with a goal in extra time as Chelsea beat Manchester United FC 5-4 in the League Cup last Wednesday. Eden Hazard's 94th-minute spot kick made it 3-3 and forced the additional half-hour for a Blues team that will now travel to Leeds United AFC in the quarter-finals on 19 December.
- It was the sides' second meeting in three days at Stamford Bridge after a 3-2 league defeat by Sir Alex Ferguson's men in which Branislav Ivanović (63) and Fernando Torres (68) were sent off. Coupled with the Shakhtar loss, it consigned Chelsea to their first back-to-back defeats since November 2011.
- Roberto Di Matteo is in the running to be named FIFA Coach of the Year, the winner of which will be announced on 7 January in Zurich. Didier Drogba, scorer of the decisive penalty in last season's final, is nominated for the FIFA Ballon d'Or award.
- Frank Lampard has not featured since aggravating a calf strain on matchday three.

Shakhtar

UEFA Champions League statistics

- This is Shakhtar's 50th UEFA Champions League game, group stage to final.
- Matchday one ended Shakhtar's four-game winless run in the UEFA Champions League at the Donbass Arena. The Pitmen had lost two and drawn two since their 3-0 round of 16 triumph over AS Roma in March 2011.
- Fernandinho's goal on matchday three was Shakhtar's 250th in UEFA competition.
- Luiz Adriano has provided three assists, the joint highest total along with SC Braga's Éder.
- Tomáš Hübschman will incur a suspension with his next booking.

Miscellaneous

- Mircea Lucescu's side beat FC Metalurh Zaporizhya 2-0 on Saturday, their 23rd successive top-flight victory – a Ukrainian Premier League record. They are the first team to win the first 14 games of a Ukrainian top-flight season and their run of scoring in each of their last 33 league matches is also a national record.
- Shakhtar are 18 games unbeaten this season, winning 17.
- Henrik Mkhitaryan has scored 14 goals in 13 league games this term; already his best ever return for a season.
- Mkhitaryan missed a penalty on 31 October as Shakhtar won 4-1 at FC Hoverla Uzhgorod in the last 16 of the Ukrainian Cup. Alex Teixeira was on target for the third successive game, taking his season tally to ten in all competitions – matching his 2011/12 haul. He could not add to that as a substitute on Saturday.
- Shakhtar will host FC Karpaty Lviv in the quarter-finals on 17 April.
- Shakhtar beat FC Dynamo Kyiv 4-1 in the Ukrainian Cup on 23 September, a result which prompted the sacking of Dynamo coach Yuri Semin the following day.
- Shakhtar signed 24-year-old striker Maicon Oliveira, last season's 14-goal joint highest Premier League scorer, from FC Volyn Lutsk during the summer and loaned him to FC Zorya Luhansk.

Head coach

Chelsea FC: Roberto Di Matteo

Date of birth: 29 May 1970

Nationality: Italian

Playing career: FC Schaffhausen, FC Zürich, FC Aarau, S.S. Lazio, Chelsea FC

Coaching career: MK Dons FC, West Bromwich Albion FC, Chelsea FC (assistant), Chelsea

- Born in the Swiss city of Schaffhausen, Di Matteo started his career with the local club, scoring two goals in 50 league appearances over three seasons before moving to Zürich in 1991. Won the Swiss league title with Aarau in 1992/93, his sole season with the club, going on to a three-year spell at Lazio.
- Became Chelsea's record signing in 1996 and paid back a chunk of that €5.85m fee with goals in their final victories of the 1997 FA Cup – after 42 seconds, then the fastest in the final's history – and 1998 English League Cup. Scored the only goal of another FA Cup final triumph in 1999/2000, the last final at the old Wembley.
- Having won 34 caps for Italy, Di Matteo sustained a triple leg fracture in a UEFA Cup tie against FC St Gallen early in the 2000/01 campaign and was forced to retire in February 2002. Then-manager Claudio Ranieri asked him to lead out the team for the 2002 FA Cup Final, which Chelsea lost to Arsenal FC.
- Took charge of MK Dons in July 2008 and, having finished third in the English third tier, was appointed by West Brom the following summer. In his first season, led the club to second place in the Championship and promotion to the Premier League but sacked in February 2011.
- That June, Di Matteo returned to Chelsea as assistant to André Villas-Boas and, following the Portuguese coach's dismissal on 4 March 2012, was appointed as interim first-team coach for the remainder of the season. After guiding the Blues to FA Cup and UEFA Champions League glory, Di Matteo was confirmed as manager on a permanent basis that summer.

FC Shakhtar Donetsk: Mircea Lucescu

Date of birth: 29 July 1945

Nationality: Romanian

Playing career: FC Dinamo Bucureşti, FC Sportul Studentesc Bucureşti, FC Corvinul Hunedoara

Coaching career: FC Corvinul Hunedoara, Romania, FC Dinamo Bucureşti, AC Pisa 1909, Brescia Calcio, AC Reggiana 1919, FC Rapid Bucureşti (twice), FC Internazionale Milano, Galatasaray AŞ, Beşiktaş JK, FC Shakhtar Donetsk

- A useful striker for Dinamo in the 1960s and 1970s, winning six league titles and 70 caps for Romania as well as playing at the 1970 FIFA World Cup, Lucescu became Corvinul player-coach in his early 30s and went on to win three Romanian championships with Dinamo.
- Fluent in six foreign languages and regarded as a workaholic, he cemented his reputation at Pisa, Brescia and Reggiana before returning home for the first of two spells as Rapid coach, winning the league in 1998 and 2000.
- Returned to Serie A for a short spell at Inter in 1998/99 before a one-season return to Rapid, going on to lift the UEFA Super Cup in his first game as Galatasaray coach in 2000. Lucescu won the Turkish title in 2001/02 and repeated the feat with Beşiktaş in 2002/03, their centenary season.
- Left Beşiktaş in 2004 and promptly joined Shakhtar, leading the club to titles in 2005, 2006 and 2008, when his side also won the Ukrainian Cup.
- In May 2009, Lucescu's Shakhtar became the first Ukrainian club to win the UEFA Cup in the competition's final edition. He suffered a heart attack that summer but swiftly returned to work, guiding the club to another league title at the end of the season and winning the domestic double in 2010/11, when Shakhtar also reached the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, and 2011/12.

- Carlos Velasco Carballo made his debut in the Spanish Liga in 2004 and has progressed rapidly through the ranks, getting his first taste of the UEFA Champions League group stage in the FC Shakhtar Donetsk-FK Partizan game in September 2010.
- An engineer from Madrid, Velasco Carballo's first taste of European competition came in April 2005 when he was selected as fourth official for three UEFA European Under-19 Championship elite round games.
- Held the same role in qualifying for the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup from 2005/06 onwards, also working as fourth official at the UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier between Turkey and Malta in September 2006.
- Awarded his first UEFA Champions League refereeing appointment when Anorthosis Famagusta FC took on SK Rapid Wien in the second qualifying round in July 2008, the following June he oversaw his only 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier, a 2-2 draw between Cyprus and Montenegro.
- A regular as a referee in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League, where he oversaw six matches in total, Velasco Carballo was also entrusted with the Estonia-Italy fixture at the start of UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying in September 2010. He reached another career pinnacle when he was appointed to officiate at the 2010/11 UEFA Europa League final between FC Porto and SC Braga and was then in the middle for two group matches at UEFA EURO 2012.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- Holders Chelsea FC are hoping to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage). In 1992/93, FC Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and lost 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United FC (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six in 2007/08 aged 43 years and 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared; he was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos FC's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer 04 Leverkusen on 7 March 2012. Eight players, including Messi, have scored four times in a game, most recently FC Bayern München's Mario Gomez on matchday eight last season.
- Barcelona have finished as group winners on 13 occasions, one more than Manchester United and Real Madrid.
- Five teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96), Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage) and Real Madrid (2011/12).
- Fifteen teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including Villarreal CF, FC Oţelul Galaţi and GNK Dinamo Zagreb in 2011/12.
- Barcelona scored 20 goals in the 2011/12 group stage, equalling Manchester United's competition record from 1998/99. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage, a tally matched by Real Madrid last season.
- Only two teams have failed to score in a group stage: RC Deportivo La Coruña in 2004/05 and Maccabi Haifa FC in 2009/10.
- Dinamo Zagreb conceded 22 goals in the 2011/12 group stage, a new record. The previous highest goals against total was 19, shared by MŠK Žilina (2010/11), Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96 were Legia Warszawa that same season before Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, as did Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
