Match background

An emphatic away victory on matchday two has put UEFA Champions League holders Chelsea FC in pole position in Group E and they now travel to Ukraine for a first meeting with FC Shakhtar Donetsk.

• The Blues' 4-0 win at FC Nordsjælland followed an opening 2-2 draw at home to Juventus. Shakhtar had seized the early initiative in the section with a 2-0 home defeat of the Danish debutants and followed up with a 1-1 draw at Juventus.

Match background

- These are the first opponents from Ukraine Chelsea have met but this is the fourth time in five seasons Shakhtar have faced an English side. Most recently they beat Arsenal FC 2-1 at home in the 2010/11 group stage thanks to goals from Dmytro Chygrynskiy and Eduardo, having gone down 5-1 in London.
- In 2008/09 Shakhtar overcame Tottenham Hotspur FC 2-0 in Donetsk in the UEFA Cup round of 32 for a 3-1 aggregate success en route to lifting the trophy. A year later their title defence was ended by a 1-1 home draw against Fulham FC at the same stage after a 2-1 first-leg loss in London.
- Shakhtar have won three of their four home games against English opposition, starting with a 3-0 victory over an Arsenal side including Ashley Cole in the 2000/01 UEFA Champions League first group stage.
- The victory over Nordsjælland ended a run of four home European games without a win for Shakhtar. In Donetsk last season they drew with APOEL FC (1-1) and FC Zenit St Petersburg (2-2) before a 2-0 defeat by FC Porto ensured they finished bottom of the group.
- Chelsea have lost only two of their last 11 away group games, winning five, though they failed to record a victory on their travels in last year's group stage, drawing 1-1 at Valencia CF and KRC Genk before going down 2-1 at Bayer 04 Leverkusen.
- Chelsea are unbeaten in 27 group stage fixtures at Stamford Bridge. Their last defeat came on 1 October 2003 when Shakhtar coach Mircea Lucescu guided Beşiktaş JK to a 2-0 win.

Team ties

- Tomáš Hübschman was part of the AC Sparta Praha team that lost 1-0 at home to Chelsea before drawing 0-0 away in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Petr Čech and Hübschman are team-mates for the Czech Republic and played together at Sparta in 2001/02.
- In his three-year spell with Arsenal FC between 2007 and 2010, Eduardo only once faced Chelsea, losing 3-0 at home in the Premier League on 29 November 2009.
- On 9 September 2009 Eduardo scored in Croatia's 5-1 defeat by England in a 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier at Wembley. Frank Lampard struck twice for the home team.
- Lampard was on target again at Wembley on 11 September, beating Andriy Pyatov from the penalty spot to earn England a 1-1 draw against Ukraine in qualifying for the 2014 World Cup. Yaroslav Rakitskiy played the whole match with Marko Dević and Vyacheslav Shevchuk coming on. Daniel Sturridge and Ryan Bertrand made substitute appearances for England on their competitive senior international debuts.
- Pyatov, Rakitskiy and Dević all started the 1-0 group stage loss to England in Donetsk that eliminated co-hosts Ukraine from UEFA EURO 2012 on 19 June. Shevchuk and Olexandr Kucher were unused substitutes while Cole and John Terry played 90 minutes for England.
- Last year Oscar played alongside Ilsinho for SC Internacional.
- David Luiz helped SL Benfica to a 2-1 win against Shakhtar in Donetsk in the 2007/08 group stage.
- Fernandinho and Willian play with David Luiz, Ramires and Oscar in the Brazilian national team.

FARE Action Week

• Matchday three of the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Europa League will contribute to the fight against all forms of discrimination in football stadiums as UEFA gives its full support to Europe's biggest anti-discrimination campaign – the FARE Action Week. Forty matches across the competitions on 23, 24 and 25 October will reinstate UEFA's commitment to ensuring that European football is free of racism, intolerance and xenophobia.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Matchday one ended Shakhtar's four-game winless run in the UEFA Champions League at the Donbass Arena. The Pitmen had lost two and drawn two since their 3-0 round of 16 triumph over AS Roma in March 2011.
- Shakhtar have scored 248 goals in UEFA competition.

International duty

- Seven Shakhtar players were on senior duty during the international break: Andriy Pyatov, Olexandr Kucher (Ukraine), Tomáš Hübschman (Czech Republic), Darijo Srna, Eduardo (Croatia), Henrik Mkhitaryan (Armenia) and Răzvan Raţ (Romania).
- Mkhitaryan scored Armenia's goal in a 3-1 FIFA World Cup qualifying defeat by Italy on 12 October.
- Eduardo was on target in Croatia's 2-0 home win against Wales on 16 October.
- Pyatov saved a penalty but could not avoid defeat as a Ukraine side also including Kucher went down 1-0 at home to Montenegro on 16 October. Pyatov had kept a clean sheet four days earlier in a 0-0 draw in Moldova.

Miscellaneous

- Mircea Lucescu side's beat FC Illychivets Mariupil 2-1 on Friday, their 21st successive top-flight victory a Ukrainian Premier League record. They are the first team to win the first 12 games of a Ukrainian top-flight season and their run of scoring in each of their last 31 league matches is also a national record.
- Mkhitaryan has scored 14 goals in 12 league games this term; already his best ever return for a season.
- Shakhtar beat FC Dynamo Kyiv 4-1 in the Ukrainian Cup on 23 September, with Dynamo coach Yuri Semin sacked the following day. The Donetsk outfit will travel to FC Hoverla Uzhgorod in the last 16 on 31 October.
- Shakhtar signed 24-year-old striker Maicon Oliveira, last season's 14-goal joint highest Premier League scorer, from FC Volyn Lutsk during the summer and loaned him to FC Zorya Luhansk.

Chelsea

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Chelsea's 4-0 victory at FC Nordsjælland on matchday two was the fifth time the Blues have scored four or more goals in an away UEFA Champions League game.
- Chelsea became the fifth successive UEFA Champions League holders to draw on matchday one of the following season. As with the previous four, they won comfortably on matchday two.
- Before matchday one, Chelsea had only once previously let slip a two-goal lead in the UEFA Champions League, against AS Monaco FC in the 2004 semi-final.
- Chelsea have conceded 99 goals in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.

International duty

- Thirteen Chelsea players were called up during the international break: Cole, Gary Cahill, Frank Lampard, Ryan Bertrand (England), John Obi Mikel, Victor Moses (Nigeria), Eden Hazard (Belgium), Branislav Ivanović (Serbia), Petr Čech (Czech Republic), Fernando Torres (Spain), David Luiz, Oscar and Ramires (Brazil).
- Cole won his 99th cap as England were held to a 1-1 FIFA World Cup qualifying draw in Poland on 17 October, a match delayed by a day due to torrential rain. Cahill started the 5-0 win against San Marino five days earlier, a game Lampard (calf) and Bertrand (illness) missed.
- Mikel and Moses (2) scored as Nigeria beat Liberia 6-1 on 13 October to book a place in the 2013 Africa Cup of Nations. Two days earlier Oscar scored twice two goals as Brazil beat Iraq 6-0 in a friendly in Sweden.
- Oriol Romeu played both legs as Spain beat Denmark 8-1 on aggregate in their play-off tie to book a place in the UEFA European Under-21 Championship.

Miscellaneous

- Chelsea are enjoying their best start to a league campaign since 2005/06, when they won the title.
- John Terry and César Azpilicueta played for Chelsea U21s on 17 October in a 2-0 friendly win against Arsenal FC.

Head coach

FC Shakhtar Donetsk: Mircea Lucescu

Date of birth: 29 July 1945 Nationality: Romanian

Playing career: FC Dinamo Bucuresti, FC Sportul Studentesc Bucuresti, FC Corvinul Hunedoara

Coaching career: FC Corvinul Hunedoara, Romania, FC Dinamo Bucuresti, AC Pisa 1909, Brescia Calcio, AC Reggiana 1919, FC Rapid Bucureşti (twice), FC Internazionale Milano, Galatasaray AŞ, Beşiktaş JK, FC Shakhtar Donetsk

- A useful striker for Dinamo in the 1960s and 1970s, winning six league titles and 70 caps for Romania as well as playing at the 1970 FIFA World Cup, Lucescu became Corvinul player-coach in his early 30s and went on to win three Romanian championships with Dinamo.
- Fluent in six foreign languages and regarded as a workaholic, he cemented his reputation at Pisa, Brescia and Reggiana before returning home for the first of two spells as Rapid coach, winning the league in 1998 and 2000.
- Returned to Serie A for a short spell at Inter in 1998/99 before a one-season return to Rapid, going on to lift the UEFA Super Cup in his first game as Galatasaray coach in 2000. Lucescu won the Turkish title in 2001/02 and repeated the feat with Besiktas in 2002/03, their centenary season.
- Left Beşiktaş in 2004 and promptly joined Shakhtar, leading the club to titles in 2005, 2006 and 2008, when his side also won the Ukrainian Cup.
- In May 2009, Lucescu's Shakhtar became the first Ukrainian club to win the UEFA Cup in the competition's final edition. He suffered a heart attack that summer but swiftly returned to work, guiding the club to another league title at the end of the season and winning the domestic double in 2010/11, when Shakhtar also reached the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, and 2011/12.

Chelsea FC: Roberto Di Matteo

Date of birth: 29 May 1970

Nationality: Italian

Playing career: FC Schaffhausen, FC Zürich, FC Aarau, S.S. Lazio, Chelsea FC

Coaching career: MK Dons FC, West Bromwich Albion FC, Chelsea FC (assistant), Chelsea

- Born in the Swiss city of Schaffhausen, Di Matteo started his career with the local club, scoring two goals in 50 league appearances over three seasons before moving to Zürich in 1991. Won the Swiss league title with Aarau in 1992/93, his sole season with the club, going on to a three-year spell at Lazio.
- Became Chelsea's record signing in 1996 and paid back a chunk of that €5.85m fee with goals in their final victories of the 1997 FA Cup – after 42 seconds, then the fastest in the final's history – and 1998 English League Cup. Scored the only goal of another FA Cup final triumph in 1999/2000, the last final at the old Wembley.
- Having won 34 caps for Italy, Di Matteo sustained a triple leg fracture in a UEFA Cup tie against FC St Gallen early in the 2000/01 campaign and was forced to retire in February 2002. Then-manager Claudio Ranieri asked him to lead out the team for the 2002 FA Cup Final, which Chelsea lost to Arsenal FC.
- Took charge of MK Dons in July 2008 and, having finished third in the English third tier, was appointed by West Brom the following summer. In his first season, led the club to second place in the Championship and promotion to the Premier League but sacked in February 2011.
- That June, Di Matteo returned to Chelsea as assistant to André Villas-Boas and, following the Portuguese coach's dismissal on 4 March 2012, was appointed as interim first-team coach for the remainder of the season. After guiding the Blues to FA Cup and UEFA Champions League glory, Di Matteo was confirmed as manager on a permanent basis that summer.

- Damir Skomina has steadily worked his way up the ranks both in his native Slovenia, where he has taken charge of three cup finals, and abroad. Cut his teeth in international football at the 2003 UEFA European Under-17 Championship and made his UEFA Cup bow in October 2003, his first UEFA Champions League qualifying appearance coming the following July.
- Fourth official for the 2003 U17 and 2005 European U19 Championship showpieces, Skomina was the youngest official at the 2007 U21 finals in the Netherlands. There he oversaw three games, concluding with the hosts' 4-1 win against Serbia in the final.
- A father of two sons who works in real estate and tourism, Skomina continued his rise to prominence by taking charge of three UEFA EURO 2008 qualifiers. He was fourth official at three matches at the finals, also overseeing two fixtures at that August's Olympic Games.
- Skomina made his UEFA Champions League group stage bow on matchday three of 2008/09 as PSV Eindhoven took on Olympique de Marseille and has since become a regular in that competition and the UEFA Europa League. Ended the 2010/11 season by taking charge of the Slovenian Cup final.
- Having overseen three UEFA EURO 2012 qualifiers, Skomina took charge of three matches in Poland and Ukraine and was fourth official for the Spain-Portugal semi-final. The 2012/13 campaign started with him being appointed for the Slovenian Super Cup and then the UEFA Super Cup between Chelsea FC and Club Atlético de Madrid in Monaco.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- Holders Chelsea FC are hoping to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage). In 1992/93, FC Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and lost 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United FC (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six in 2007/08 aged 43 years and 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared; he was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos FC's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer 04 Leverkusen on 7 March 2012. Eight players, including Messi, have scored four times in a game, most recently FC Bayern München's Mario Gomez on matchday eight last season.
- Barcelona have finished as group winners on 13 occasions, one more than Manchester United and Real Madrid.
- Five teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96), Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage) and Real Madrid (2011/12).
- Fifteen teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including Villarreal CF, FC Oţelul Galaţi and GNK Dinamo Zagreb in 2011/12.
- Barcelona scored 20 goals in the 2011/12 group stage, equalling Manchester United's competition record from 1998/99. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage, a tally matched by Real Madrid last season.
- Only two teams have failed to score in a group stage: RC Deportivo La Coruña in 2004/05 and Maccabi Haifa FC in 2009/10
- Dinamo Zagreb conceded 22 goals in the 2011/12 group stage, a new record. The previous highest goals against total was 19, shared by MŠK Žilina (2010/11), Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96 were Legia Warszawa that same season before Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, as did Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
