## THE TALK OF STAMFORD BRIDGE

**T**ODAY'S F.A. Cup-tie spans the full 61-year history of Chelsea F.C., for Hull City provided the opposition for the very first match played at Stamford Bridge.

The date: Monday, September 11, 1905. The result of that Football League Second Division fixture was a 5-1 win to us, and Jimmy Windridge claimed the first Chelsea hat-trick.

Is there anyone here today, we wonder, who was present when Chelsea played Hull in that first game of all?

\* \* \*

**An Omen?:** We strive this afternoon to reach the F.A. Cup semi-finals (draw to be made at 2.15 p.m. on Monday) for the eighth time in our history and the fourth since the war. As last year against Peterborough, we find ourselves paired with Third Division opponents on sixth round day. Not since 1915 has the North outnumbered the South 7-1 in the quarter-finals, and we would like to think it a good omen for our Wembley chances this year that when it last happened 51 years ago we were the South's lone representatives and went on to our only F.A. Cup final appearance.

**Replay Arrangements:** If today's

match is drawn, the replay will be at Boothferry Park on Thursday next (7.30 p.m.). The match will not be all-ticket, and prices will be: Seats 10/- and 12/6d, Ground 5/- (boys 2/-). Seats will be on sale **to our season-ticket holders only** at the Ticket Office after today's game on a basis of one per book (which must be produced). Season-ticket holders will also be able to buy seats from 11 a.m. until 12 noon here tomorrow, after which any remaining tickets will be put on sale to the general public until 1 p.m.

**Fairs Cup-tie:** All reserved seats have been sold for our Inter-Cities Fairs Cup quarter-final second leg against T.S.V. München 1860 on Tuesday next, kick-off 8 p.m. The match is *NOT* all-ticket. Ground admission will be 5/-, with transfer to the West Stand Enclosure (seating) 5/- and to the East Stand Enclosure (standing) 2/6d.

**Historic:** After two "near misses" in the last three seasons, we set up a new club record at Newcastle last week-end by registering our tenth away League victory of the season. The previous best was nine, achieved six times: 1905-06, 1911-12,

1925-26, 1954-55, 1962-63 and 1964-65.  
Congratulations to all concerned.

**Bonetti Milestone:** Peter Bonetti completed 250 appearances in competitive first-team football for Chelsea last Saturday, made up as follows: League 218, F.A. Cup 14, Football League Cup 10, Inter-Cities Fairs Cup 8. He has reached this total in just under six years, having made his debut in April 1960. The record for appearances by a Chelsea goalkeeper is held by Vic Woodley, who, in the League alone, played 252 games for us between 1930 and 1939.

**Training Again:** Winger Tommy Robson has resumed training after an eight-weeks bout of jaundice. Ken Shellito, recovering from a cartilage operation, is feeling very chirpy about the amount of movement he is now getting in the left knee. The new club bike — in royal blue, of course — is proving a big help to Ken's progress. George Graham has missed the last two games because of a back injury which he had been "carrying" for a week or two, but at the time of writing was confidently expected to be passed fit for today's tie.

## FOR THE RECORD

● Receipts of £16,097 (including season-tickets) at our last home match, against Manchester United, set a new record for a League fixture at Stamford Bridge.

● Sale of 59,900 programmes at the same match beat the previous club record of 58,000 held by Manchester United, and took our total programme sales for the season past the half-million mark.

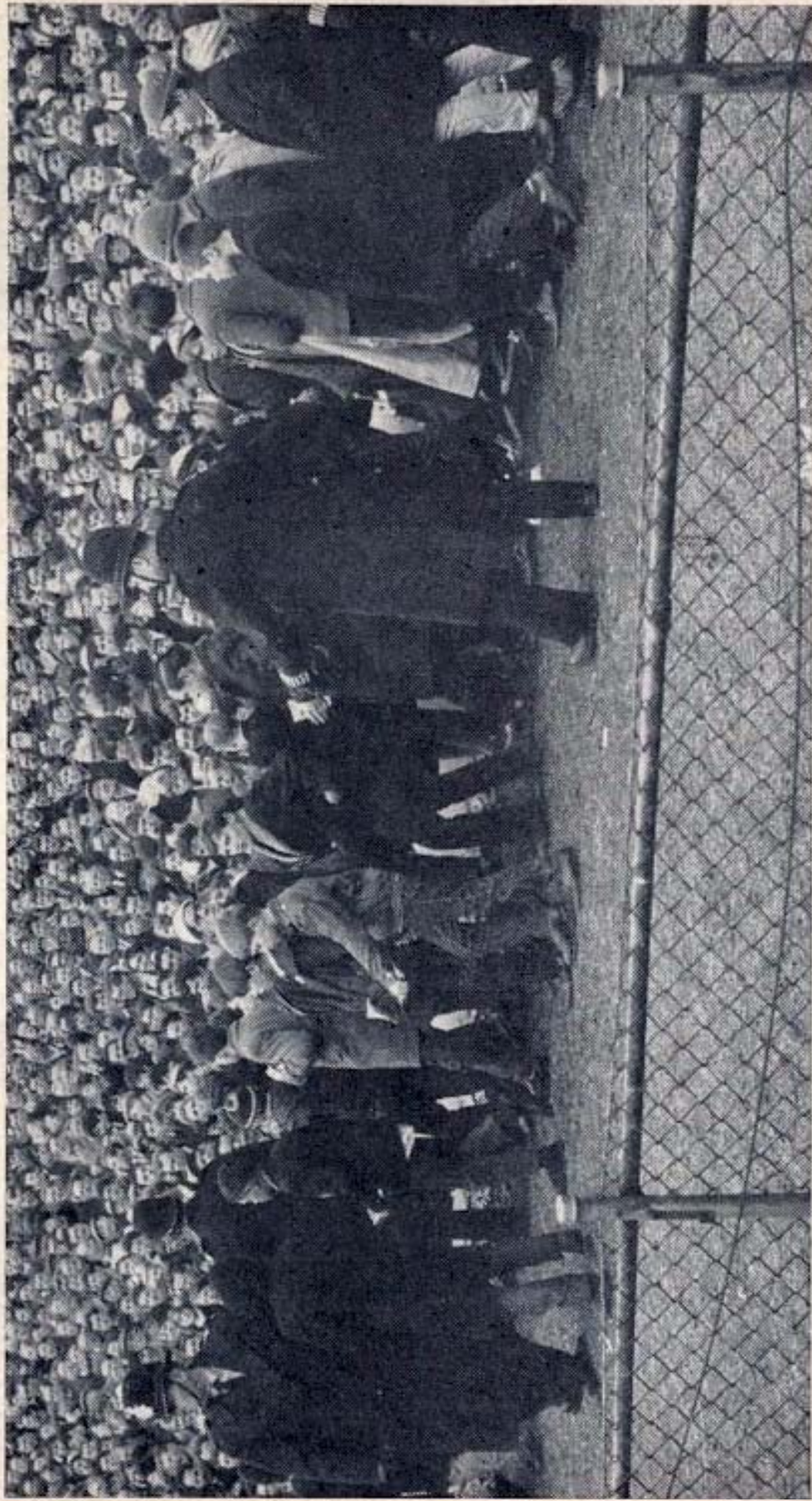

## AN IMPORTANT REFERENCE TO OUR LAST HOME MATCH



**T**HIS photograph was taken at our last home match against Manchester United, which began 12 minutes late because the surrounding track had to be cleared of young spectators. Bearing in mind all the warnings that had previously been given, it was decided immediately afterwards to withdraw the concession of half-price admission for children.

Later, at a conference held with senior Police officials, it was confirmed that Police Officers did, in fact, lift young boys on to the greyhound track for their safety. Other youths — not regular supporters — took advantage of the situation to invade the arena and so caused the kick-off to be delayed.

In view of the circumstances, we have decided to re-instate half-price admission for children. We would stress, however, that we cannot permit invasion of the playing arena at any time. Also, we consider that very young children unaccompanied by adults should not attend matches at which large crowds can be expected.

## HE'S IN CHARGE

THE appointment of Mr. Jack Taylor, from Wolverhampton, for today's match means that all four of our F.A. Cup-ties this season have been handled by referees who are on the 31-strong panel named by F.I.F.A. to take charge of this summer's World Cup tournament.

Mr. Taylor, 36, a master butcher by trade, officiated in the Birmingham League and Worcestershire Combination on his way to the Football League list, to which he was promoted in 1957. His big-match appointments include, besides many Internationals, the finals of the Amateur Cup and the Irish Cup.

FIRST DIVISION LOOK**

**J**UST over a year ago Hull City made their third £40,000 plunge into the transfer market in two months, signing Ken Houghton from Rotherham to add to the forward skill and power just previously acquired in the persons of Ken Wagstaff, from Mansfield, and Ian Butler, also from Rotherham.

Understandably, the club hoped that these players would help to clinch promotion at the end of the season, but the final table showed Hull in fourth place, two points short of what was needed.

There have been no major signings since. Hull have not needed fresh faces this season. The side has blended into one of the most successful and attractive to be found outside the First Division. The League table indicates that they already have one foot in the Second

Division, and although our aim today is to prevent them going any nearer to success in the F.A. Cup, our best wishes will go with them for the rest of their League season.

For ambitious Hull City are clearly a club with *First Division* potential. Under the chairmanship of Mr. Harold Needler, they have set out to provide the best of everything for the fans at Boothferry Park — the best football, the best ground, the best lights, the best players.

In the summer of 1963, Mr. Needler gave the club shares worth £450,000. This enabled Hull to erect a £53,000 gymnasium and training centre, a six-pylon, best-in-Britain floodlighting system, a £120,000 cantilever stand and, last season, to spend £120,000 on transfer fees for three forwards.

## *The Hull City Story*

Already there is a solid record of achievement. In the normal course of events one would hardly expect a Third Division team to reach the sixth round of the Cup, yet Hull are here today, having beaten First Division Nottingham Forest, and Southampton, high in the Second, on the way.

In the "promotion stakes" they are well ahead of the third placed club, Queen's Park Rangers, and it will need a remarkable collapse for them not to be playing in Division II next August.

Their last 12 fixtures (League and Cup) have produced 11 wins. The exception was a 3-3 draw at Q.P.R. in the League.

Manager Cliff Britton went to Hull in 1961, after spells with Burnley, Everton and Preston North End. There were only ten professionals on the staff when he arrived.

How successfully he has met the challenge can be seen in the club's record. Of course, it helps in the Third Division if you have the money to buy the players you need.

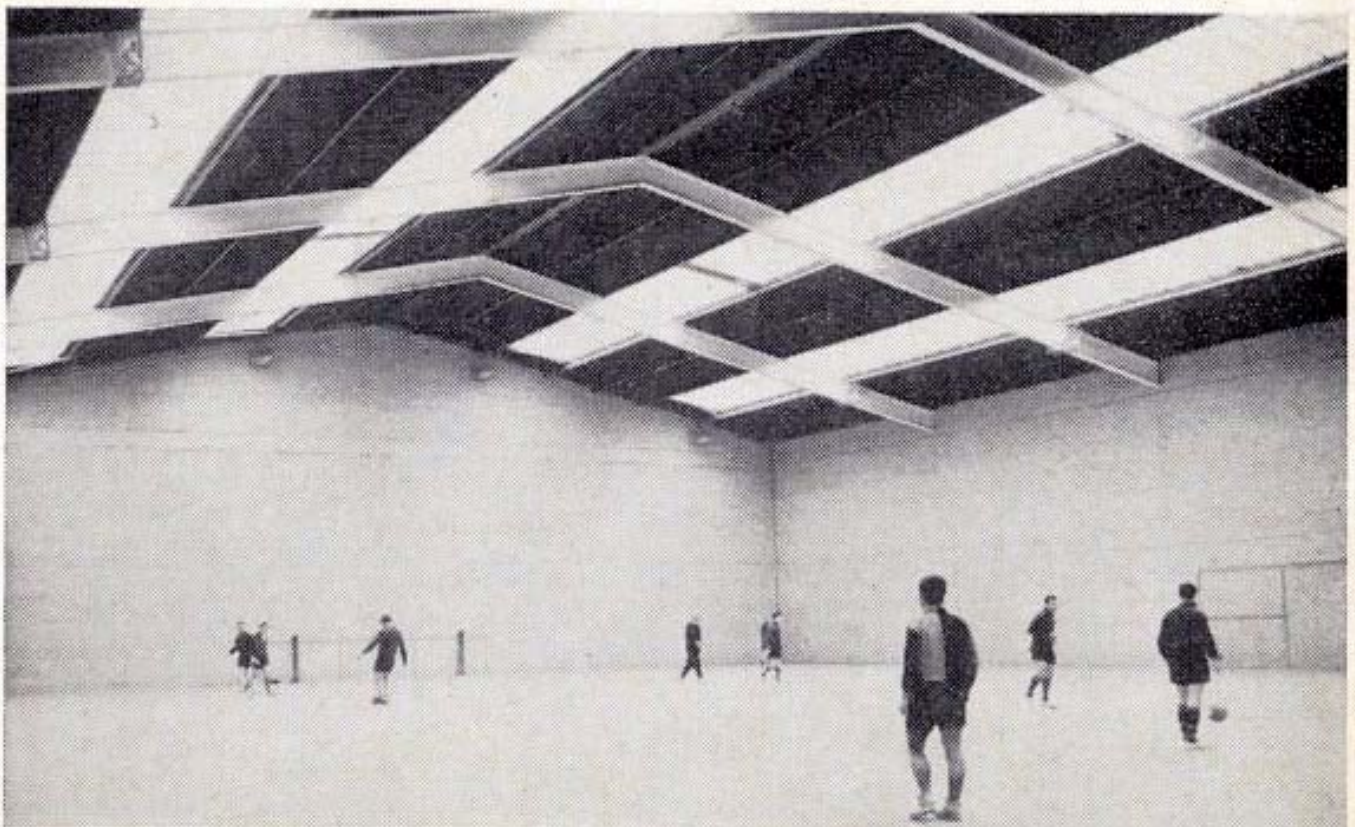
For one of the players he wanted, Mr. Britton came to Stamford Bridge in June 1963 and signed Dennis Butler, so it will be something of a "special mission" on which this young full-back returns here today.

Hull's other main buys, Wagstaff, Ian Butler and Houghton, have proved so successful that the club have scored more goals this season than any other in the Football League.

### **Hop on a Train**

A lot of the money has gone into buying the best facilities, too. For instance, if you are in the town and want to see Hull City play, all you do is hop on a train, and alight at their own railway station. Turnstiles lead from the platform direct into the ground.

Inside, there is cover for 30,000 spectators, 10,000 of them seated. Hull's concern for the customer is evident from the fact that they used to be able to accommodate 50,000 fans, but with the structural improvements of recent years this has been reduced to 40,000.

Hull have acquired a cantilever stand providing 3,000 seats. Their recently-installed floodlighting system is said to set a new high standard in ground illumination, and the club also possess one of the finest indoor training centres to be found anywhere in the Football League.

It cost some £50,000 and means that, no matter how bad the weather, no Hull team ever turns out anything less than 100 per cent prepared. Adjoining the main ground they have their own outdoor training pitches.

In keeping with all these amenities, Hull count their footballers among the best paid in the country. Their League gates this season average 21,000 and, like our own, the players are handsomely rewarded for the success they are earning for their club.

In comparatively recent times Hull have become one of the most progressive clubs in British football. How many years — or how few — before they come to Stamford Bridge to play us for Championship points?

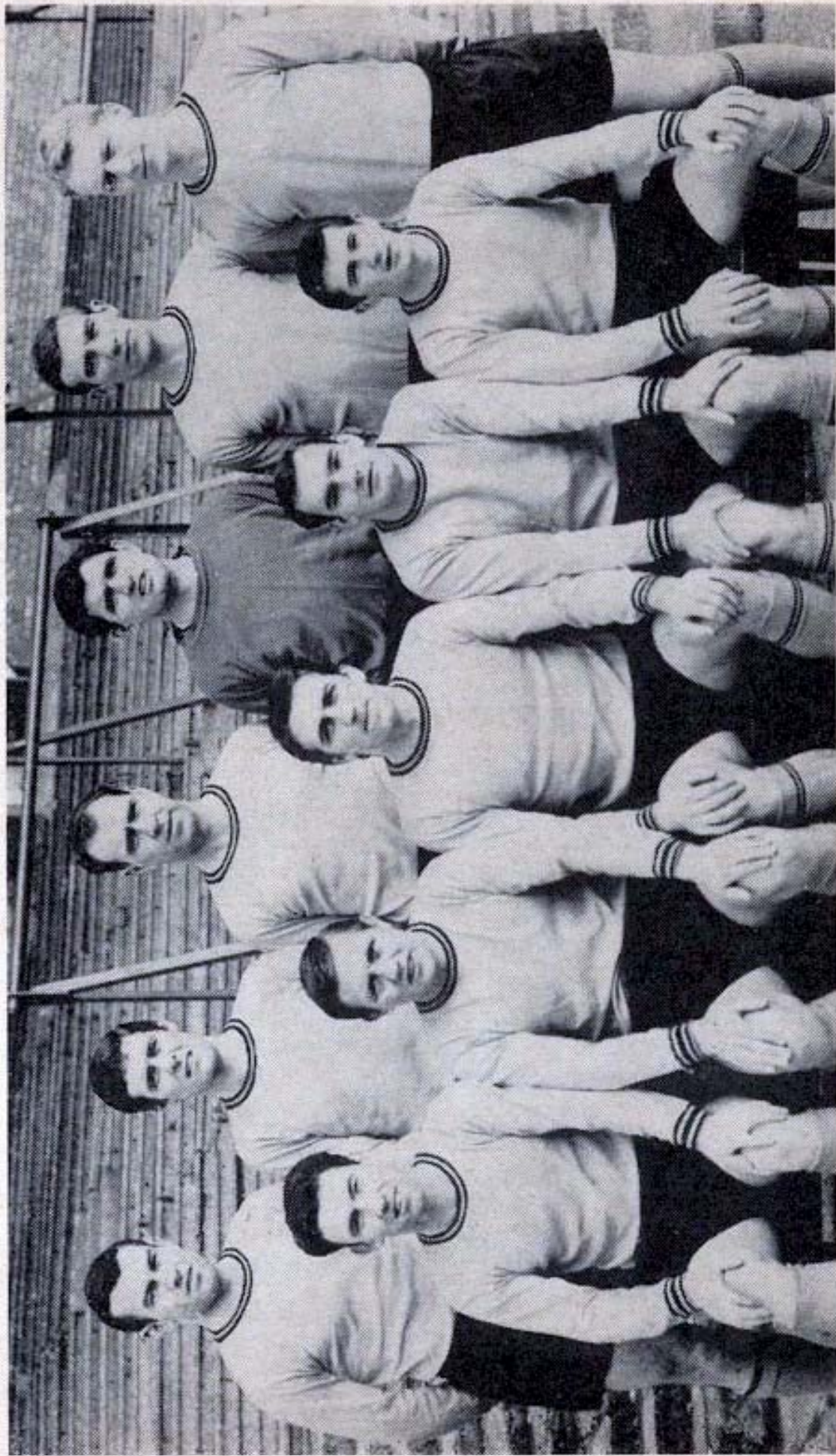

### YEAR THEY WERE MISSING

**W**HEN the F.A. Cup tournament was resumed after the war, in season 1945-46, Hull City were missing from the entrants. The club had been almost wiped out by enemy air attacks, several direct hits destroying the Anlaby Road ground. But whatever else they lacked in 1946, it was not stout hearts. A new set of directors floated 100,000 shares, and within a few days the public subscribed £40,000. A bare site at Boothferry Park was acquired, so was a skeleton team; Major Frank Buckley was persuaded to leave Wolves to become manager. Thus was the new Hull City born.

### BEST CUP RUN

**H**ULL CITY'S farthest progress in the F.A. Cup was to the semi-final in season 1929-30. Despite having a relegation fight on their hands, they advanced towards Wembley with wins against Plymouth Argyle, Blackpool, Manchester City and Newcastle. Then, in the semi-final, they met Arsenal at Leeds and drew 2-2. Arsenal won the replay by 1-0 at Villa Park and went on to win the Cup, but for Hull the season ended with relegation from Division II to the Third Division North.

### UPS & DOWNS

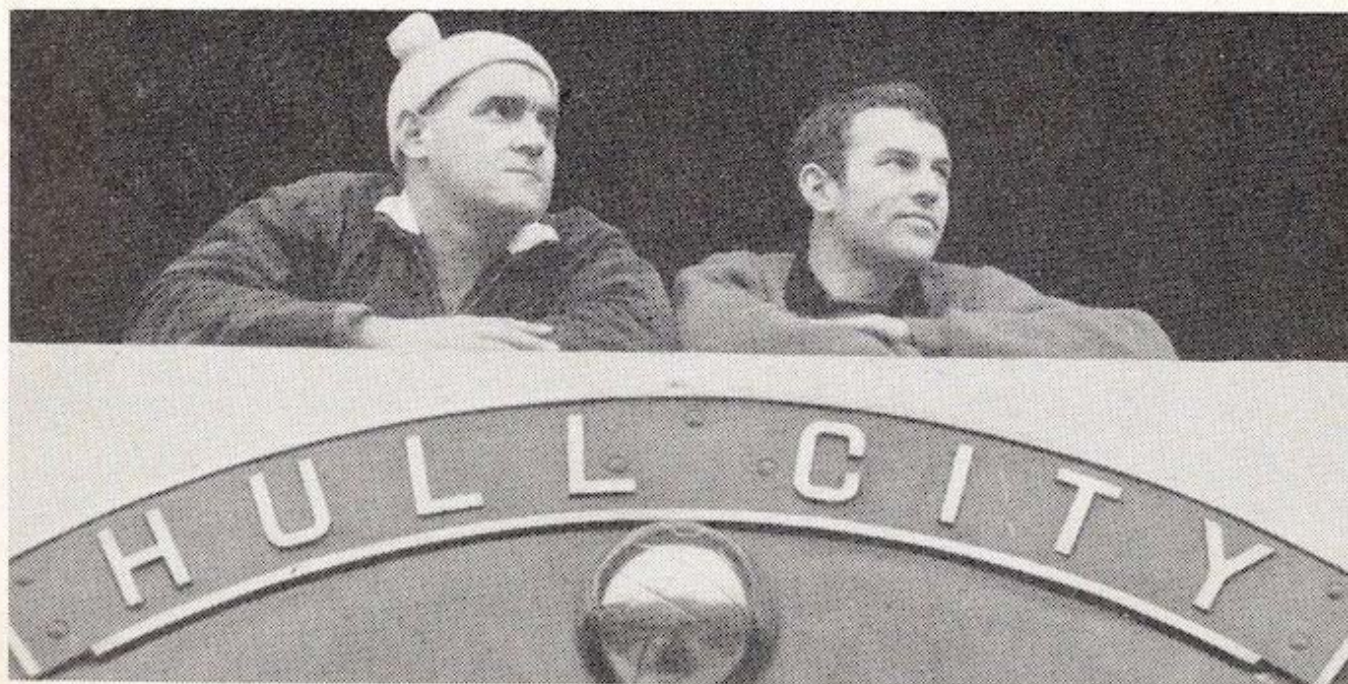
**H**ULL CITY, formed as an amateur club in 1902, gained admission to the Second Division of the Football League in 1905, the same year as ourselves. Changes in their League status have been as follows: 1930 relegated to Div. III North; 1933 promoted to Div. II; 1936 relegated to Div. III North again; 1949 promoted to Div. II; 1956 relegated to Div. III North; 1958 elected to newly-formed Div. III; 1959 promoted to Div. II; 1960 relegated to Div. III.

### BIGGEST CROWD

**T**HE attendance record for Boothferry Park is 55,019, set up on February 26, 1949 when Hull met Manchester United in the sixth round of the Cup.

### LAST QUARTER-FINAL

**H**ULL's best Cup progress since the war, which they have equalled this season, was to the sixth round in season 1948-49, when, at home to Manchester United, they lost by the only goal. Compensation came at the end of the season when they won the Div. III North championship. Hull's last F.A. Cup appearance in West London was in season 1959-60, when Fulham beat them 5-0 in a third round tie.

# THEIR PLAYERS

**G**OALKEEPER **Maurice Swan** spent three years with Cardiff City before joining Hull in 1963. An Eire international, he has been in splendid form since regaining his place from local-born Mike Williams last October.

Right-back and skipper **Andy Davidson**, a Scot from Douglas Water, has been on the Boothferry Park professional staff since 1950 and made his 450th League appearance last Christmas — a total which would have been considerably higher had he not had the misfortune to break a leg three times.

**Dennis Butler** will be meeting some former colleagues this afternoon, for he was three years a Chelsea professional before moving to Hull in the summer of 1963. He has become a regular choice with the "Tigers", playing particularly well this season.

A former Welsh amateur international, Wrexham-born **Alan Jarvis** began his career with Everton. He joined Hull on a free transfer in the 1964 close-season and has played regularly since October last year.

Another player who took time to establish himself is centre-half **Mike Milner**. Born locally, he joined the professional staff in 1958, but did not play regularly until season 1963-64.

**Chris Simpkin**, also a native of Hull, is a former apprentice who signed full-time in 1962 and played his first senior game, at inside-right, in August that year. He was successfully switched to wing-half two years ago.

**Ray Henderson**, a North-easterner from Wallsend, began his career as an inside-forward with Middlesbrough, with

whom he spent three years as a professional. He was transferred to Hull in the 1961 close-season.

The first of Hull's three major signings last season, **Ken Wagstaff** arrived from Mansfield Town in November 1964. He was a prolific marksman in his four years with Mansfield, and has continued in the same vein on Humberside.

Centre-forward **Chris Chilton** signed professional for Hull, his home-town club, in 1960. He has been leading scorer in three of the last five seasons, occasionally playing at inside-forward.

In 14 months at Boothferry Park, inside-left **Ken Houghton** has fully justified the £40,000 Hull paid Rotherham for his transfer. He is City's leading scorer this season with 24 goals in all games.

**Ian Butler's** partnership with Houghton began at Rotherham. He was transferred on New Year's Day, 1965, and has contributed a great deal to Hull's success this winter, scoring 13 goals in League and Cup games. He is not related to Dennis Butler.

Reserve **Terry Heath** was previously with Leicester City. Injuries led to his inclusion for the fourth round tie with Nottingham Forest and he scored both goals from inside-left.

## THEIR MANAGER

**CLIFF BRITTON** began a great playing career with Everton in 1930 and soon rose to international rank, playing wing-half for England 12 times before the war, as well as in many war-time games. He became manager of Burnley, but returned to Goodison Park as manager in October 1948. He resigned in February 1956, but six months later Preston persuaded him back into football. He stayed at Deepdale until April 1961, and the following July was appointed by Hull City. Their regard for him is clear from the fact that after two years he was given a ten-year contract.

MEET OUR NEW FULL-BACK

# JOE KIRKUP

**T**HERE have been few swifter transfers than that which brought Joe Kirkup, 25-year-old full-back, to Chelsea, a fortnight ago. Less than 24 hours after West Ham announced that they were prepared to release him, Joe signed for us, but the pace of events did not end there. Within another 24 hours Kirkup was making his Chelsea debut here against Manchester United and, three days later, was in our Fairs Cup line-up in Munich. The fact that he was not Cup-tied with West Ham this season also made him eligible – by one day – for today's match (he signed 15 days ago, and the minimum required is 14).

Reflecting on all that has been packed into the past fortnight, Joe says: "I've hardly got my breath back yet. After having only three reserve games in seven weeks, I found myself in against Manchester United. You can't go in deeper than that when you're a bit short of match practice, and I was glad we had a couple of early goals to play with because I was struggling for pace in the last 15 minutes.

"When Chelsea came for me I didn't need asking twice. Yet only the night before I was wondering where my next club would be. Staying in London football is great. I already knew most of the lads here – when I won my three Under-23 caps in season 1961-62 Peter Bonetti and Marvin Hinton were in the side, too – and coming to Chelsea also means that my wife Jill and I do not need to move home from Abridge, Essex. I can get to Stamford Bridge by car in 90 minutes."

Kirkup, born at Sunderland, won school-boy honours for Northumberland at wing-



half. Newcastle were interested in him, but a West Ham scout spotted him, and having relatives at Dagenham swayed Joe's decision to join the Upton Park groundstaff.

England Youth honours followed, and Joe made his League debut away to Manchester City in December 1958. In first-team competitions for West Ham he played more than 200 games, and at Wembley last May gained a European Cup-Winners' Cup medal against T.S.V. Munchen 1860, the team we meet here on Tuesday. "I'm confident that, in normal conditions, we shall pull it off", is his forecast. "We all but beat them on a dicey snow-covered pitch over there last week."

Most of all, Joe Kirkup relishes the prospect of an F.A. Cup-winner's medal. He was in West Ham's first-team "pool" of 16 players but not in the actual 11 who won the Cup two years ago. In welcoming him to Stamford Bridge, we share his sentiments about that F.A. Cup medal, and hope we can go a stage nearer its fulfilment this afternoon.

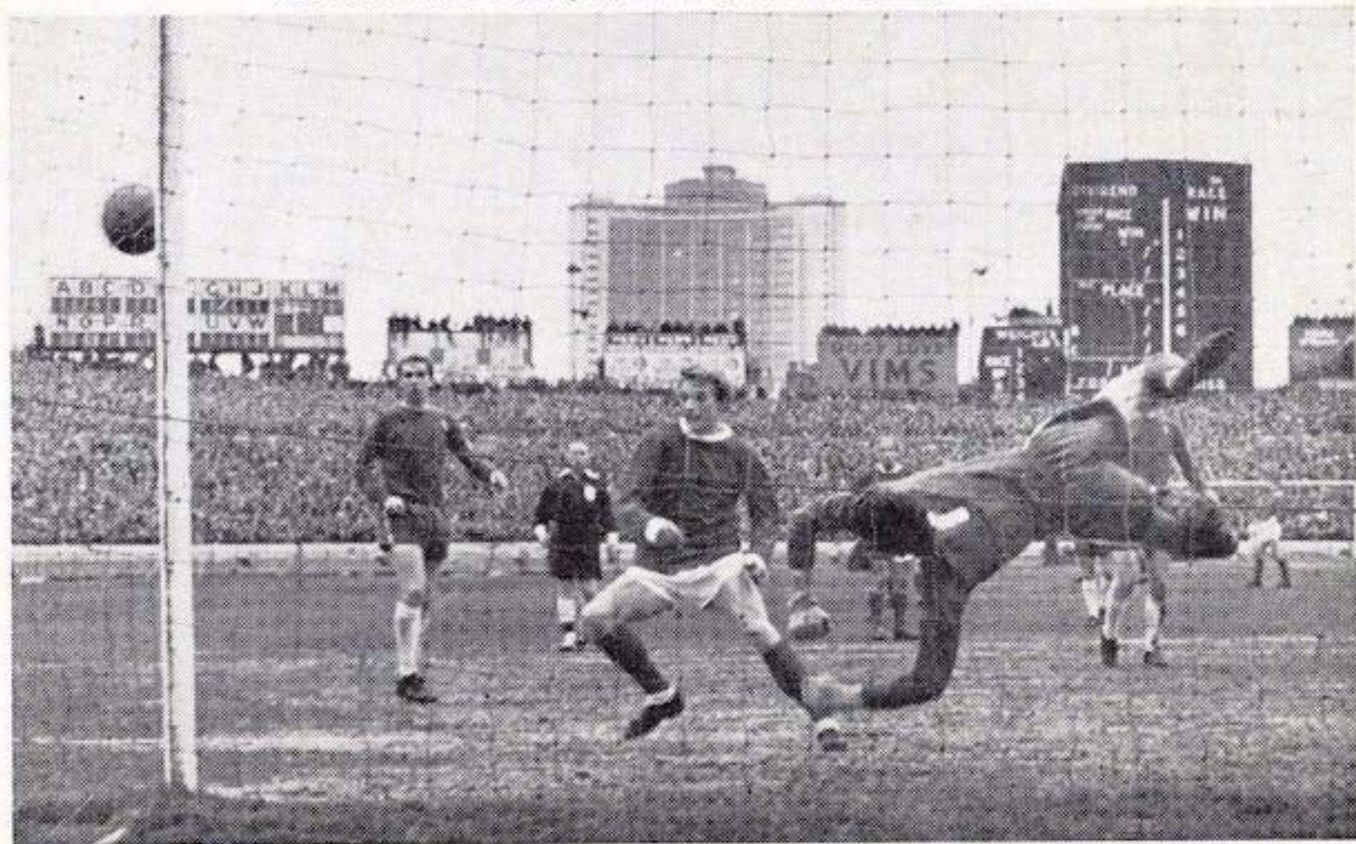

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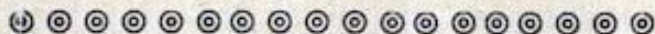
