

## The Talk of Stamford Bridge

TODAY'S fixtures are the reverse of those played on the opening day in August, and for us that was a day when Arsenal comprehensively beat us three-nil at Highbury. So, in welcoming them to Stamford Bridge, we also welcome the comparatively early opportunity to put that result right. Then, as soon as this match is over, both clubs will be concentrating on a European date next Wednesday, when Arsenal meet the Swiss team, Grasshoppers in Zurich, while we are in Sweden to face Atvidaberg.

Next Saturday we are at home again, to Southampton, and as a result of Monday's replay victory against Nottingham Forest, we stage a fourth round League Cup-tie against Bolton Wanderers on Wednesday week (Oct. 27), a week before the European Cup-Winners' Cup home leg against

Atvidaberg.

With regard to both the Bolton and Atvidaberg matches here, would Season Ticket Holders please note that they have until Friday next (Oct. 22) to claim their seats. This can be done either in person during normal office hours or by post. In each case they should quote reference number on their SRS season-ticket, block/ door, row and seat number.

Injury report: Peter Houseman, who fell on his left shoulder in Monday's replay, is likely to be missing 2-3 weeks with a damaged ligament. Chris Garland, who injured an ankle ten days ago against Forest, resumed light training on Tuesday. John Dempsey's bruised instep is progressing well.

Good luck, Keith: Two weeks ago Keith Weller moved to Leicester City, where he has joined another former Chelsea forward, Alan Birchenall. In his one season at Stamford Bridge, Keith was our leading scorer with 14 goals and helped in the winning of the Cup-Winners' Cup. We wish him the best of luck with his new club.

## FRONT COVER SHOT

FOR our cover photograph today we go back to the corresponding match against Arsenal in August last year and see John Hollins on his way to scoring the goal that won him the "Golden Goal" award for 1970-71 on London Week-end Television's "Big Match" programme.

Hollins is shown beating Arsenal's double challenge by a split second and lifting the ball over Bob Wilson. It hit the bar and rebounded . . . and John, chasing back from the by-line in a sweeping half-circle, smashed the ball into the roof of the net for the opening goal in our 2-1 win.

Chelsea fans voted it the "greatest solo goal ever seen at Stamford Bridge. John rates it "the best goal I've ever scored—I don't think I'll ever get another quite as good"... but that hasn't stopped him trying.

Having finished 1970-71 with nine goals, his best total in any one season, he is already on the way to beating it with eight this season. You can see them all on the centre pages.

## OUR FIRST POINT IN NINE VISITS TO ANFIELD

Liverpool manager Bill Shankly didn't appreciate the way we drew at Anfield last Saturday. But then, he's not used to Chelsea taking a point up there—we'd lost our last eight League games at Liverpool. And the last time a Chelsea goalkeeper kept a clean sheet there was in October 1919. So take a bow, Peter Bonetti and company.



Bill Shankly said: "Chelsea didn't come to Anfield even hoping to score a goal". Tommy Baldwin looks as if he means business, though, in this face-to-face, toe-to-toe encounter with Ray Clemence.



Bill Shankly said: "Our goalkeeper might just as well have sat up in the stand with me." Instead, Clemence is on his knees, as Baldwin rolls into the net. It's a sequel to the top picture, and a free-kick to Liverpool.

## SYDNEY TAFLER

THE reason Sydney Tafler became a Chelsea fan is there with him in the picture above: his 13-year-old son Jonathan, whose bedroom at their West London home is plastered with Chelsea photographs, pennants, charts, banners . . . blue and white everywhere. Says Sydney: "He's an academic boy really—goes to Latymer, and I hope he makes Cambridge as his elder brother Jeremy did—but since he was about nine my wife (actress Joy Shelton) and I have had a football maniac on our hands.

"I never used to go. For 25 years, Saturday to me meant racing, either going or watching it on the box. Then Jonathan started nagging away at me to go to Chelsea with him and one day, for peace and quiet, I decided to give the horses a miss. By the time I came home from Stamford Bridge that night I was hooked, and have been ever since.

"Mind you, what a fantastic introduction I had, because that was the season Chelsea won the F.A. Cup. I was nearly ill with excitement at Wembley and didn't get to Old Trafford for the replay. When we equalised against Leeds at Wembley so near the end, I looked at Jonathan and he and an old fellow of about 80 were hugging each other with joy.

"They didn't know each other, hadn't met before, and I thought 'What a marvellous thing this football is, that it can bring people together like that.' It was one of the greatest sporting moments of my life.

Sydney Tafler, London-born, left council school at 14 and got a job in Houndsditch Warehouse at 23/- a week. He had always wanted to act, and some time after leaving school his headmaster arranged for him to enter for a scholarship at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art.

In a "field" of 40, young Tafler was first past the post. His certificate said "You have some dramatic ability"—and Sydney was launched on a career of straight, comedy and character acting that has put him on the screen in more than 100 films and 300 TV performances.

One series of "Alexander the Greatest" for ATV has just finished. Another is due to follow soon, but before that you can see him solo as an old violinist (not that you'll recognise him through the make-up) in "Farewell Performance", in BBC TV's "Thirty Minute Theatre".

Back to football, today's match will stretch family ties almost to breaking point, because brother-in-law film director Lewis Gilbert is a rabid Arsenal supporter. Of the new stadium now being planned at Stamford Bridge, Sydney says: "I hope Chelsea provide the equivalent of a members' enclosure at racing, where you can get a meal before the match and a drink in comfort at half-time.

"Car-parking facilities, too. What a performance I go through at big matches like today's, I start by driving here before midday, to get parked nearby for after the game. Then I take a taxi home to have lunch and another one back here for the game.

"I know it sounds mad . . . but we're a Chelseamad family. Our three 'seasons' in the West Stand are always taken. If Jeremy doesn't come, we bring Joy. She's first reserve! I suppose, on balance, I'm saving money, not going racing now on Saturdays. You could say the horses are paying for our seasontickets."





## BETWEEN OURSELVES

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Programme Editor

MOST of us have a skeleton of some sort in the cupboard. I become aware of mine every time Chelsea play Arsenal . . . so I might as well confess. You see, although my working association with Chelsea goes back 22 years to the start of the 1949-50 season, it was Arsenal who won the first battle for my boyhood pocket-money. And Tottenham. During war-time, they shared the White Hart Lane ground. You saw Arsenal playing there one week in the League South, Spurs the next, and on days when landlord and tenant clashed out in the middle my shouts were always for Arsenal.

Alf Kirchen was one of the strongest-running, hardest-shooting right-wingers I've ever seen. Denis Compton was another of my heroes on the left—what a left foot, and what battles he and that hard-as-nails Spurs right-back Ralph Ward had whenever they met.

And it was Arsenal who introduced me to Stamford Bridge. I'd never crossed London this far until May 15, 1943, when war-time North and South Cup-winners Blackpool and Arsenal met here. The team-sheet is in front of me as I write, and at least one colleague in today's Press Box will remember that particular game—Bernard Joy. He was programmed as Flt./Lt. B. Joy, Arsenal's centre-half, with Flying Officer Jack Crayston and Cpl. George Male (captain) on either side of him, R.A.F./Sgt. Laurie Scott and L/Cpl. Leslie Compton behind, Flt./Sgt. George Marks in goal and, up front, Flt./Sgt. Kirchen, Pilot Officer Ted Drake, L./Bdr. Reg. Lewis, Cliff Bastin and Sgt. Compton (D.).

Blackpool, too, had a bit of a team, and from two down in seven minutes (Drake and Lewis were Arsenal's scorers), they responded with four goals (Dix, Dodds, Finan and Burbanks) in a wonderful match watched by 55,000. Matthews was the only Blackpool forward who didn't score, but the Maestro did just about everything else.

On the way out I buried my red and white rosette deep in my pocket, but it was not a day of total disaster. After all, I'd been to Stamford Bridge for the first time, and went home with the feeling that it would not be the last.

Between times, Arsenal have played here on many occasions, and just to bring things right up to date with today's game, did you hear the no doubt apocryphal story of the 'phone call Dave Sexton had the other day? It came from the wife of a life-long Chelsea supporter. "He's dying," she said, "and his last wish is to say a few words to you, Mr. Sexton." So Dave, being the decent chap he is, pops round to the house a few streets from Stamford Bridge. Outside, there's a fellow busy painting the place in red and white; indoors, the old 'un is propped up on his deathbed in a room that's garlanded with red and white.

"It's all right, you've come to the right house, Mr. Sexton," murmured the departing one. "I had to speak to you, because after following Chelsea for 65 years, I wanted you to know that I'm changing to Arsenal."

"But why?" asked Dave. "We've won a couple of cups for you these past two seasons, haven't we?" "That's right," came the reply. "But we're playing Arsenal this week, and I reckon if someone's going to die, it's better it's one of their devils than one of us!"


