WEDNESDAY night provided its surprises, starting with the teams special salute to the Chelsea fans. Happily, he was also among three Chelsea goal-scorers, and we went through to our fourth semi-final in consecutive seasons—the second in succession in the League Cup. Well done all!

Sticky month: Dave Sexton took the players to the National Recreation Centre at Bisham Abbey on Monday, and after two days there they travelled direct to the game against Notts County. Today we get down to First Division matters again, aware that the last four League results have done nothing to assist our Championship prospects. Two draws and two defeats have widened the gap between outselves and the leaders from three places to six, from three points to six. Our last League win was against Tottenham on October 21, and we hope our next is also gained against London opponents in these next ninety minutes. Equally, we acknowledge that Crystal Palace have been very much on the "up and up" in recent weeks . . . that they are growing more determined every match to end that sequence (currently standing at 27 games-10 drawn, 17 lost), of never having taken two points off a London club since they came into the First Division in 1969 . . . and that they have two players above all others who will want to do well against us this afternoon!
