

He has left with the good wishes of everybody here and knowing that he will always be our welcome guest. Following Danny's departure, the Board decided to draw up a short list for the position of manager, and meanwhile Geoff Hurst continues his duties as coach and in complete charge of the playing side. An announcement of the appointment of our new manager will be made as soon as possible.

While spectator conduct at Stamford Bridge has improved in some ways, we are aware of a problem that is on the increase this season. We refer to obscene language and singing. A considerable number of those responsible were ejected at the last home match against Birmingham, and we would like the vast majority of our decentminded spectators to know that in conjunction with the Police we shall continue to take strong action to rid our stadium of this offensive behaviour, whether it occurs in the stands or on the terraces.



SCOTT CHESHIPE LOOKS

CHELSEA through the years: season 1934-35

N spite of the difficult experiences of the previous winter, Leslie Knighton began his second season as Chelsea's manager without any notable additions to the playing staff. Tom Priestley was an absentee, having returned to his native Ireland, never again to play first-class football, a loss balanced to some extent by the return of Alec Cheyne from France.

If the absence of transfer activity was an expression of confidence on the manager's part, such optimism was soon dispelled. A three-goal reverse at Derby on the opening day of the season was followed, four days later, by a home defeat at the hands of Sheffield Wednesday. By the end of September two points from seven games meant that we were again bottom of the First Division.

New blood was clearly an urgent requirement. First came a diminutive winger from Barnsley, Dick Spence, who not only ended the season as leading scorer but found that London so suited him that he remained on the Stamford Bridge payroll for more than 40 years. Indeed, his familiar features and wiry figure, little changed from his playing days, are occasionally still part of the match-day scene here. Within weeks Willie Barraclough had been signed from Wolves to play on the opposite wing just days before Hughie Gallacher was transferred to Derby County.

The Scot's 81 goals in 144 first-team appearances was an impressive statistic garnishing the genius of one of football's legendary all-time "greats." Hot-tempered, and often victimised on the field as a result, he was at 5ft. 5in. one of the most skilful centre-forwards and deadly marksmen in the game's history.

In George Mills Chelsea had an obvious replacement but, on Christmas Eve, another star crossed the Irish Sea when Joe Bambrick arrived at Stamford Bridge. Within four months he had scored 15 goals from 21 games and helped to lift us from 21st place to twelfth. Here, too, was a greatly respected and popular man whose skill and sportmanship were a byword throughout a distinguished career which bought him eleven Irish caps. Earlier this year a testimonial dinner was held in Joe's honour in Belfast where, at 73, he still lives.

Six points from the three Christmas games made for a happy start to the New Year and, perhaps aided by a disappointing Cup exit in a replay at Luton, we steadily pulled clear of trouble. By this time Jimmy Argue had won his place at inside-forward and, with Harry Burgess arriving from Sheffield Wednesday, manager Knighton had rebuilt his entire forward line.

Certainly the goals were flowing. Bambrick scored four in our 7-1 win over Leeds; Spence all four in the defeat of Liverpool. And exactly fifty goals from 22 home games kept the fans well entertained. Yet, the lack of consistency was still evident. A 4-2 win over Wolves on Good Friday was followed, in 72 hours, by 0-6 and 1-6 defeats at Liverpool and in the return fixture at Wolverhampton. Exasperating Chelsea!

ANDY RANKIN: Former Everton goal-keeper, now Watford's senior player. Twice their Player of the Year with a record number of appearances approaching 300. Has played in all four divisions of the Football League. Born Liverpool.


TREVOR HOW: 21-year-old defender who has progressed from juniors of his only club. Son of speedway ace of the fifties, Ronnie How. Can play midfield. Born Amersham.

STEVE SIMS: Central defender who cost a Division III record fee of £200,000 when signed from Leicester in December 1978. Tall and sturdy with ten Under-21 England caps. Born Lincoln.

IAN BOLTON: Bargain £12,000 signing from Notts County. This courageous, hardworking central defender has scored 15 goals for Watford, mostly penalties, in over 90 appearances. Once loaned to Lincoln, manager Graham Taylor's former club. Born Leicester.

STEVE HARRISON: Defender signed from Vancouver Whitecaps, after playing originally for Blackpool. A great competitor, who has settled in well since last season, when making 23 League appearances. Born Blackpool.

RAY TRAIN: Experienced midfield player who has helped four clubs win promotion. Previously with Walsall, Carlisle, Sunderland and Bolton, who sold him to Watford for £50,000. Small but gifted ball distributor. Born Nuneaton.



ROGER JOSLYN: Experienced midfield man whose consistent displays were a factor in last season's promotion. Previously with Colchester and Aldershot, he totals some 450 League appearances. Born Colchester.

BRIAN POLLARD: Small, speedy winger who drops back well to help in defence. Gained promotion with his previous club York City. Recovered from knee injury sustained last season. Born York.

BOBBY DOWNES: Experienced forward signed from Rochdale for a bargain £5,000 five seasons ago. Has made well over 200 appearances for Watford. Accurate crosser of the ball and fierce long-shot. Born Bloxwich.

ROSS JENKINS: 6ft. 2in. striker who cost £30,000 from Crystal Palace, he has twice been Watford's Player of the Year. Prolific goalscorer, leading the table with 29 in League games (37 in all matches) last season. Born Kensington.

LUTHER BLISSETT: West Indian striker and England Under-21 international who gained a further cap against Denmark last week. Scored twice in each of the League Cup-ties last season against Newcastle, Manchester United and Stoke. Born Jamaica.

KEITH MERCER: Determined front runner with well over 100 appearances for Watford, he was voted Player of the Year at Vicarage Road in 1977-78 season. Born Lewisham.







WATFORD come to Stamford Bridge today increasingly aware of their ability to do more than just survive in the Second Division. Their meteoric rise from the Fourth Division has made them one of the Football League's more fashionable clubs. Everything about Watford—the pop star chairman Elton John, thrusting, innovative manager and highly-respected backroom staff—is seemingly geared for success.

But at the start of this season there were signs of self-doubt, an unwelcome relic of the days when they struggled among the also-rans. A League Cup defeat by Colchester only served to emphasise the cynics' belief that the Watford bubble might be about to burst. The players seemed to doubt that they could continue the club's progress.

Despite a first-day defeat at Leicester, manager Graham Taylor restored his team's confidence with the simple message: "You are in the Second Division—enjoy it." He says: "We should relish this season. We are playing on good grounds against clubs like Chelsea with great traditions."

Watford's only previous experience of the Second Division was a brief and unhappy one. They spent three seasons struggling, eventually being relegated in 1972, with only 19 points. No one doubts they are now better equipped for the challenge that faces them. They have a proven goalscoring pair in Ross Jenkins and Luther Blissett, a capable midfield and a defence that features the ever-improving Steve Sims.

Sims personifies the positive nature of the new Watford. He was signed from Leicester City last December at a club record fee of £200,000 and has surmounted initial problems to recapture the form that won him England Under-21 honours.

Blissett, the lean, lithe striker who leapt to national prominence with the two goals that knocked Manchester United out of the League Cup last season, has also gained international recognition.

Already this season he has given notice that he will be a handful for any Second Division defence. He has deft control and is nerveless in front of goal.

His partner Jenkins, the Football League's leading scorer last season with 29 goals, is equally dangerous. Gangling he may be, but his aerial ability makes him lethal.

Before Graham Taylor arrived at Vicarage Road, Watford had a lack-lustre past, enlivened by a run to the semi-finals of the FA Cup in 1970.

That was abruptly ended by Chelsea, who beat them 5-1 at White Hart Lane. The only man from that Watford team still with the club is Tom Walley, youth team coach.

Today marks Watford's first League visit to Stamford Bridge. They are averaging a point per game, and have drawn four of the season's first six matches in the Second Division.



MIGHAEL HART EVENING STANDARD Says

petrangle but Peter Shilton thinks that Chelsea's Yugoslav is a pretty useful exponent at the art of goalkeeping. The other day I attended a lunch in London at which Shilton, one of the world's foremost goalkeepers, talked about his trade and the men who have most influenced him.

Borota's name cropped up a couple of times, but one of the goalkeepers Shilton most admired was a Chelsea star of the recent past—Peter Bonetti.

Shilton, the 30-year-old Nottingham Forest goalkeeper who has 28 England caps—and would have had many more had it not been for Ray Clemence—closely studied three men during his days as a youngster at Leicester City.

One of them, of course, was the incomparable Gordon Banks, a vital member of England's World Cup-winning team of 1966 and the first-team goalkeeper at Leicester when Shilton was at Filbert Street.

"Everyone thinks I modelled myself on Gordon, but that is only partly true," said Shilton. "He was a fantastic goalkeeper and I had great admiration for him. I based much of my game on his style, but there were qualities about two other men that I also particularly liked. They were Bonetti and the legendary Russian goalkeeper Lev Yashin.

"Peter Bonetti was at his peak with Chelsea when I was just starting," said Shilton. "He was strong and wiry, not built as heavily as I am now, and maybe this gave him his tremendous natural agility.

"He was probably the fastest goalkeeper around at that time. One of the things I most liked about him was the way he would come out of his goal and collect crosses other goalkeepers would think twice about.

"He had the judgement to dominate not just the six-yard box, but the whole penalty-area, and that is something I try to do now. In fact, in today's game I think a goalkeeper has got to be prepared at times to push forward almost as far as the half way line."

Of Yashin, Shilton said: "I met him once when I was a young lad. I don't think he was technically as good as Gordon or Peter but he had this image, this presence... size combined with agility.

"Size is important in a goalkeeper. When an opposing forward looked at Yashin he must have wondered how on earth he was going to get past him. That's probably one of the things that made Peter Bonetti so great. He wasn't big, but he compensated for that with his agility.

"With Yashin it was his size. Just by walking out on to a pitch, dressed all in black, he looked invincible."

Shilton played first for his hometown club of Leicester City before moving to Stoke for a then record fee of £340,000 in September 1974. Two years ago Brian Clough, a long-time admirer, paid £270,000 to secure his services for Nottingham Forest.

"In terms of value, I think a good goalkeeper is second only to a good striker," said Shilton. "But it's no good expecting a good goalkeeper to work miracles in a poor defence.

"Our success at Forest is because of the team effort. I've played my part but basically the whole team has worked well together. I feel I was playing as consistently at Stoke, but it wasn't noticed because the team were struggling."

Shilton listed five qualities he believes every good goalkeeper should possess—physique, a safe of pair of hands, agility, courage and personality.

Chelsea's current goalkeeper, Petar Borota, has his share of each of these attributes and, in terms of personality is one of the top men in the League.

Of course, Petar has experienced a few problems that only a foreign goalkeeper could face. The language is the biggest single hurdle.


At the England get-together before the international against Denmark last week, Geoff Hurst was discussing goalkeeping with Shilton.

"Apparently, in the past when Petar has come out to collect high crosses his shouts for the ball have not been consistent," said Shilton. "He might shout 'It's mine' or 'leave it', or 'I'll get it'.

"Well, Geoff has been teaching him to shout just 'keeper' each time he comes for the ball, and he's beginning to do that now. He's a good goalkeeper, and he can only get better playing in the Football League."
